REPORT OF THE PRIEST INCUMBENT

In the natural course of events one must expect changes and St. Peter's Cathedral is no exception to this general rule. In the not too distant future we must expect a change in the Incumbency and make preparations for it.

During the past year there have been no spectacular gains or losses, but the work of the Church has been steadily carried on.

The Women's Guild has again by sheer hard work made the Annual High Tea and Sale of Work a great success.

The Choir is fortunate to have Miss Brenton as its Director and should be complimented on the music provided in general and particularly on special occasions.

The Vestry and Rector have worked well together and there has been a good attendance at the regular monthly meetings.

The A. Y. P. A., though not a large group is a happy one and has been actively engaged all the year.

The Cubs and Brownies continue to function and we feel that a strong committee will be a great help to them.

The Sunday School has had a good year. Two new teachers, Miss Priscilla Griffith and Mr. A. Breedon have joined our staff. We regret the loss of Miss Barbara Pickard and Miss Viola Kays. The Incumbent takes a class of Senior Boys every Sunday at 10 a.m. and the Rev. W. G. Hogg teaches the Seniors at the 2.30 p.m. session. Two very faithful Teachers are Miss Helen Acorn and Miss Helen McKarris. Devotion to such an important part of the Church's work demands our highest praise.

All the Clergy of the Province have assisted at our services—Rev. S. J. Armstrong and Rev. A. Piercey have preached, and the latter has come cheerfully to our aid when his help was needed.

We are very grateful to the Rev. W. T. Warren of Morrisville, Pa., U.S.A., who kindly supplied at St. Peter's in July.

His Lordship the Bishop has been with us twice and on March 9th ordained Mr. W. G. Hogg to the Diaconate. We offer him our hearty congratulations on the fulfillment of a desire long deferred. He has been of the greatest help to St. Peter's and its Incumbent at the regular services and on special occasions, and has in addition done much to carry on the services at Georgetown and to assist other Parishes when needed.

We have received from Miss Maria Easton the gift of a beautiful Lectern Bible in memory of the Easton Family of East Royalty.

The Incumbent celebrated the forty-fifth anniversary of his Ordination to the Priesthood in February and on May 10th the University of King's College conferred on him the Degree of Doctor of Divinity. This occasion was marked by the presentation of a purse and other valuable gifts by members of the Congregation. Twice dur-

ing the year he has been obliged to be absent from the Parish on the business of the Church. In March he was at Quebec Lodge for a meeting of the Prayer Book Revision Committee, and in September at Victoria B. C. for the election of a Primate. The Most Reverend Walter Barfoot, Archbishop of Edmonton was chosen and we pray that under his guidance the work of the Church may go forward successfully.

We hope that the Reports of the Wardens and Treasurer will be carefully studied.

The Every Member Canvass should be undertaken early this year and those approached should be ready whenever possible to increase their envelope subscriptions. More money is needed since costs are greater.

We cannot help feeling that the "Cent-a-Meal" scheme is not meeting with the support it deserves. Many more could take boxes and a substantial amount could be realized for debt reduction.

For those whom death has taken from us we pray "Rest Eternal grant to them, O Lord" and for those by whose benefactions we have especially benefitted we ask that God would reward them for their gifts to His Church.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH WARDENS

During 1951 the re-roofing of the west side of the Church, Chancel and Sacristy was undertaken and satisfactorily completed. As this work progressed many other items of repair came to light which had not been foreseen, but which had to be done in order to make a satisfactory job. These repairs were made and it is now thought that we have a good roof which should last 30 or 40 years.

Outside of the interior decoration of the Church and Chancel, we do not anticipate any major repairs to the church fabric for a few years at least. Itemized, the work done in 1951 is as follows:

- (a) Roof of Church, Chancel and Sacristy stripped and replaced with 240 lb. Asphaltic shingles and cemented down, with 45 lb. layer of asphalt roofing underneath.
- (b) Chapel roof repaired and slate replaced where necessary.
- (c) Coping stones on North ends of Church and Chancel West roofs bricked in from eave to ridge where wood and mortar had rotted out.
- (d) Repairing conductors and replacing some.
- (e) Leak in Church gallery found to be coming from valley at base of West tower where copper was eaten through, this was repaired and new copper flashing installed.
- (f) Underground roof drainage on West side of Church was found to be rotted out and collapsed. This was dug up and replaced with asphaltic no-corrode pipe.
- (g) The space between the sidewalk and street curb in front of Church was cleared of tree stumps and asphalted from street corner to Sunday School gangway.
- (h) The broken concrete sidewalk from the street to the Sunday School entrance was dug up and replaced with a stronger mix, at the bare cost of the concrete.
- (i) New metal railings were installed at the front entrance of the Church.
- (j) A new automatic water feed was installed in the main furnace. This will work with hand firing, automatic firing, or oil burning, and is a safeguard against furnace damage such as we were faced with some years ago.
- (k) New locks placed on kitchen cupboards and new shelving installed.
- (l) Repairs to several leaks in Church heating system.
- (m) An electric floor polisher purchased for Church.

During the past three years the sum of \$8,727.23 has been spent on Capital or non-recurring expenditures with an increase of only \$2805.64 in our liabilities. This year we are faced with what is we hope the last major Capital expenditure, the interior decoration of the Church. This should include the tiling of the Chancel floor and the carpeting of the Sanctuary floor. An estimate on this work is in the vicinity of \$3000.00.

Another matter closely tied in with interior decoration is the installation of a modern and more efficient lighting system and should be considered.

While the envelope receipts have, we believe, reached an all time high we are again asking for an increase. Our liability to the Bank is close to \$17,000.00 and with this year's proposed expenditure will reach \$20,000.00. With envelope receipts at \$5000.00 we should be able to pay off about \$2000.00 a year and thus wipe out the debt in ten years. We ask every member of the congregation to give this matter serious thought and increase both sides of the envelope. This year we had to take \$48.00 from the Church funds to meet our Missionary apportionment. For 1952 we are asked for \$300.00 more than in 1951 which means that the right hand side of the envelope will have to bring in \$350.00 more than 1951.
