REPORT OF THE RECTOR, VEN. ARCHDEACON J. R. DAVIES, M.A.

There are two things to be noted at once about St. Peter's record in the Year of our Lord 1964. Our congregation gave generous support to the expanding needs of the Church in the world; and, at the same time, we were able to make long needed improvements in the Cathedral Building.

Last year was the first of five during which our Canadian Church has undertaken to raise \$500,000 a year for the strengthening of the work of our Anglican Communion throughout the world. This of course is one of the proposals resulting from the Anglican Congress at Toronto, under the principle of Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence.

The special concern of the Anglican Church of Canada in 1964 has been the African Diocese of Rwanda and Burundi, where a training college for catechists and lay readers is sorely needed, as well as other facilities and equipment for the Church's work in that strategically important area. Our own Diocese of Nova Scotia has undertaken to contribute \$20,000 a year for the five years mentioned above. The suggestion was made by the Executive Committee that each parish should try to raise at least 8% of its Apportionment figure as its share of the responsibility. Your Rector is proud to report that St. Peter's contribution in the amount of \$457.75, raised through our 1964 Lenten Self Denial offerings, represents more than 4% beyond the minimum suggested. Also generously supported was the Primate's World Relief Fund to which we sent \$402.55.

All this is as it should be. Our first concern as Christians should be not for ourselves but for others. We have reason then for quiet satisfaction in what we have accomplished in the way of a helping hand.

But we have also cause for satisfaction when we look at the freshly-painted walls of the Cathedral, complementing 1963's new floor. Add to this the splendid oak parquet floor in the Sanctuary, and the beautiful priests' sedilia, memorials to Charles McKarris and Walter Aidan Cotton, Priest, respectively, and we have visible evidence of important improvements made during 1964. It had been our hope to improve the facilities of the parish hall during the year as well; but a survey made by a competent person indicated that it would have been unwise to spend money on "improving" a none too solid frame building, now eighty-five years old.

The spiritual statistics of 1964 show a reasonably healthy state of affairs, although the situation is much the same as in other years with regard to the weekday Chapel services. This in spite of many reminders and urgings during the year.

Despite some difficulty in finding teachers for certain classes the Sunday School has had a good year, with attendance well up throughout. The traditional Summer Outing and Christmas Party were very successful, and the more recently introduced custom of giving presents instead of receiving them at Christmas is surprisingly popular with the children, who happily donated seventy-five nicely wrapped and labelled gifts for shipment to needy boys and girls in the western part of the Deanery in time for Christmas Day.

As their reports show our organizations have for the most part been busy and productive. It has not been a good year however for two of our youth groups, the J.A. and the A.Y.P.A. Several of our young people have moved away, thus weakening the strength of the latter and depriving it of leadership. And in spite of repeated appeals from the pulpit no one has yet offered her services as a leader of our young girls in the Junior Auxiliary, which has in consequence been inactive since September.

We are grateful to the men of the congregation for their help to the parish during the year. We thank Mr. Armstrong and Mr. Kays for their services as Lay Readers. We thank the Church Wardens and the Vestrymen for their attention to the temporalities of the parish, the Servers for their faithful attendance at the Altar, the Laymen's Association for financing the transportation to the Sunday School Picnic. We thank all our workers and leaders, men and women, in such departments and groups as Sunday School and Choir, the Girls' Auxiliary, the Little Helpers, the Girl Guides, the Wolf Cubs. But a glance at the reports elsewhere in these pages will show that in 1964, as in other years, the main burden of the Cathedral's activities was carried by the women of the parish. Where would the Church's work be without them? Rise up O men of God, the Church for you doth wait!

It should be in the record that our work and worship in 1964 have taken place in the historic year of the Centennial observances, and the Royal Visit. These events brought many more visitors than usual to the Province, and a glance at our Visitors Book will show the names of people from every province in Canada, and almost every state in the Union. Not a few comments were made by these visitors upon the attractive appearance of Cathedral and Chapel alike, further proof of the Vestry's wisdom in renovating

and redecorating the former in time for the Centennial Year.

Among the many visitors to St. Peter's who took an active part in its services were the Lord Bishop of the Diocese who was here on four occasions and the following priests: the Reverend S. J. Armstrong, E. L. Elias, A. W. Garwood, G. E. Moffatt, the Very Reverend H. L. Nutter and the Reverend W. T. Warren. A distinguished layman, in the person of Dr. Harry Smith, President of Kings College, also spoke in the Cathedral one Sunday.

Mr. Axworthy our new Sexton is doing an efficient job in keeping our buildings and grounds clean and tidy. In fact the job is often done by team-work, Mrs. Axworthy and their son Wayne lending a hand. The services of all three are much appreciated.

So far the "votes of thanks" in this report have been on your behalf to certain individuals and groups in the Congregation. It remains for your Rector to express his own personal appreciation for the co-operation and encouragement given him during the year past. The greetings and gifts that came from so many of our parishioners at Christmas may perhaps be taken as tokens of your friendship and support. May God give us grace to serve and worship Him together in the New Year upon which we are entering.

The Afternoon Branch of St. Peter's Cathedral W.A. held usual meetings during the year except when cancelled due to extreme weather, with an average of 18 Members attending. Mrs. Jean Peake was warmly welcomed as a new Member transferring from the Evening Branch.

All Members were deeply grieved at the death of Mrs. W. G. Hogg, a very faithful and hardworking Member, she is much missed. Our dear Miss M. Cotton suffered a serious illness and is still confined to her bed in a Nursing Home. She fulfilled many duties of the W.A. and in her latter office as Prayer Partner she kept Members informed most conscientiously. Her familiar figure is always missed from our meetings, whatever the weather she was always there.. Mrs. R. Paton another Member who left the Province is also missing at Roll Call. It would seem that our numbers are dwindling and any Church Member not belonging to either Group would be happily welcomed.

Mrs. George Rogers presided at most meetings, but during any unavoidable absence Mrs. H. Burt capably carried out her

duties, and we were kept well informed of Church and W. A. activities.

Mrs. H. H. Simpson in her new office as Treasurer presented reports monthly and duly maintained accounts.

During one of Archdeacon Davies inspiring talks to the group he said and I quote "Full Communion can mean much or little and we must seek to receive and also to share and give service to others". This I felt was worthy of mention again in this report and I feel sure that all Members strive towards this message.

Mrs. L. Davison also spoke in April on "Who are we working for and where does the work go". It was most informative. The Gordon School receives the bulk of the work as the new School for Indians at Le Toque Quebec was not yet opened. Many pictures showing the facilities at the new School were shown.

Other happenings during the year was the inscribing of the name of Miss Maria Easton in the Book of Remembrance; Mrs. H. L. Palmer was made a Life Member of the W.A.

Cotton capably supervised our Dorcas work assisted by her Committee and Mrs. Cosh without whom no report would be complete, maintained contact with our Refugee Olga and forwarded money and parcels. The work displayed at the closing Meeting on April 13th, 1964 shewed that the high quality and standard is being maintained.

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MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL - 4 FEB.1964

CHAIRMAN - ARCHDEACON J. R. DAVIES

PRESENT - 33 Persons

Meeting opened with Prayer by the Rector.

Minutes: As minutes of the last annual meeting, also reports were included in the Annual Report, it was moved by A. H. Peake, seconded by Mrs. H. Burt that these be taken as printed. Carried.

Business from Minutes:

H. Armstrong reported that he and Dr. Kelly had visited Eastern Trust Company and that the interest rate had finally been reduced from 5% to 4% retroactive to January, 1963.

Archdeacon Davies advised that the Sunday School Dividers had been made and installed in Sunday School and were very much appreciated by teachers and pupils.

Re: Anglican Families in Parkdale - After lively discussion on this question, it was finally moved by Mrs. H. Palmer, seconded by Dr. H. Palmer to leave this matter to the President of the Laymen's Association for a project and also to the President of the Women's Guild to deal with. Motion carried.

Correspondence:

The Rector drew the attention of the Congregation to the

Correspondence, Cont'd:

Bishop's letter which referred to World Mission Appeal - Stipends for Clergy minimum now \$3000 per year - and urged Churches to send in returns -assessments, apportionments, pledges, etc. promptly.

Letter also from Mr. Wainwright urging all members of the Anglican Churches to subscribe to the Diocesan Times.

Mr. G. Reginald MacNutt sent a letter thanking St. Peter's Cathedral for help to Family Service Bureau and requesting support in the future.

All motions carried.

Archdeacon Davies commented on his report advising that the attendance at early morning services in the Chapel has been very poor. H. B. Armstrong suggested that an effort should be made by different organizations of the Cathedral in this connection, in order, like the Oxford Group Movement, to help "smarten up Churchmanship". Archdeacon Davies felt that it might become necessary to reduce the number of daily Eucharist celebrations if more people did not attend.

It was moved by H. B. Armstrong that more information with regard to activities of organizations be included in Annual Reports in addition to financial statements. Seconded by T. L. FitzGerald and carried.

A motion was put forth by Dr. H. Palmer that the Vestry be

requested to set out a list of Salaries and Honoraria in the next annual report, instead of listing one lump sum. Major MacNutt seconded the motion and it was carried.

New Business

Cemetery: Major T. MacNutt mentioned that the Hodgson monument had been repaired, , but that there are several others that should be attended to. Paul Kays reported that he felt that the cemetery fence should also be fixed when finances permit.

Assessments & Apportionments, 1964: Moved by Major T. MacNutt, seconded by Paul Kays that an additional 10% be sent to the Diocese along with the usual amount.

Sexton's Apartment:

Mrs. H. Pickard, on behalf of the W.A. suggested that the Sexton's apartment needed a really good cleaning to make it livable. Mrs. Geo. Rogers Sr. agreed that it was filthy dirty and a fire trap in its present state - that steps should be taken immediately to rectify this.

Supplementary Report:

Dr. H. Kelly advised that several prospective sextons had refused to live in the present quarters unless renovations were made -- so the following supplementary report had been drawn up:-

1. A competent person be hired to assay the Church Hall building as to (1) structure (2) fire wall between Hall and Church (3) a plan to be carried out in the future to improve our Hall such as (a) excavating the basement (b) permanent outside structure of Church Hall (c) and what needs to be done.
2. Completely fix the sexton's apartment.
3. Church Hall floor.
4. Redecorate outside of Church Hall and other Church property. (Rectory and Rochford Square houses).
5. Hodgson Trustees had foresight of our needs enabling us to use endowments from Hodgson Trust Fund for these improvements.

6. Vestry appoint a committee to look into the givings and why there is a decrease in these and in attendance.

Discussion followed re feasibility of fixing up the Parish Hall or building a new one, etc., but Dr. Kelly advised that professional advice was being sought to find out the condition of the building and that a special congregational meeting would have to be called if it was found necessary to build a new one.

A. H. Peake complimented the Wardens for their hard work and conscientious efforts during the past year.

Mrs. G. Rogers made a motion that two sturdy persons be employed to clear out the attic and scrub and clean the sexton's apartment. Seconded by A. H. Peake and carried.

Resolution was presented by A. H. Peake as follows:

"BE IT RESOLVED: The Rector, Church Wardens and Vestry being the Parochial Corporation of St. Peter's Cathedral, Charlottetown, in annual meeting of the congregation assembled this 4th day of February, 1964, unanimously supports and recommends enactment of legislation providing for the addition of two years university training in Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, to permit the granting of degrees to students in Arts, Science, Commerce and Education".

This resolution was discussed at length, and it was moved by A. H. Peake, seconded by Wm. Shama that the congregation of St. Peter's Cathedral support this resolution. Carried unanimously. Certified copies of the resolution to be sent to Hon. W. Shaw, Premier and Hon. George Dewar, Minister of Education by the Vestry Clerk.

Mrs. George Rogers moved that the Choir boys be paid a minimum of 10 cents per week, from Guild funds. Seconded by Mrs. Burt and carried.

It was also suggested by Mrs. Rogers that Archdeacon Davies ask people in the congregation to return the hymn and prayer books to the back of the Church until we get a new sexton.

World Mission Appeal: Archdeacon Davies advised that our P.E.I. Deanery was to be responsible for \$1000.00 minimum for this cause and that St. Peter's should raise three or four hundred dollars. It was moved by Dr. Palmer that the matter be left to the Vestry to implement and call upon leaders of organizations to be convenors. This was seconded by H. Armstrong and carried.

Question was raised whether an infants' Sunday School class is now being taken care of and Archdeacon Davies advised that Miss Marion Ross is now in charge of this at 11 o'clock every Sunday morning.

Election of Vestry for 1964: The following names were recommended by the nomination committee for the 1964 vestry --

Submitted for 2 years starting in 1964 - Arthur Holland, David Hyndman, Frank Weatherby, Ronald Smith, Eugene Korrey, Paul Kays, also Dr. H. Kelly to replace T. Smith for one year. A. H. Peake moved nominations cease, seconded by Dr. H. Palmer. Carried.

SYNOD DELEGATES: Hon. F. Walter Hyndman, H. B. Armstrong. Substitutes - G. G. K. Peake, Paul Kays. Mrs. H. Palmer moved these delegates be re-elected. Seconded by Dr. H. Kelly and carried.

DCS DELEGATES: W. Shama declined nomination as unable to attend afternoon meetings. T. FitzGerald, George Vessey and F. Michael nominated. A. H. Peake moved nominations cease - seconded by Dr. H. Palmer. Carried.

Mrs. A. H. Peake moved that Mrs. S. Korrey be convenor of the Diocesan Times. Seconded by Mrs. W. Hogg and carried.

Moved by Mr. T. Rogers that H. R. Doane and Company be auditors. H. Simpson seconded the motion and it was carried.

The past year has been one of concern for your vestry. We started the year with no Sexton but were able to carry on due to the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore MacArthur who came to our aid and took excellent care of the Church properties until March 12th, when Mr. Alfred Axworthy was appointed sexton and moved into the sexton's quarters. Mr. and Mrs. Axworthy are doing very well and show a keen interest in keeping the properties in spic and span condition, and we are most pleased with their work.

A matter of concern to all members of the congregation was pointed up as a result of our sexton difficulties. Different applicants for the position were most critical of the type of

Our income for the past year amounted to \$25,194.98; of this \$17,128.40 came from envelope subscribers. Our total expenditures amounted to \$26,946.73. Before we can think of constructing a new hall we must pay off our outstanding liabilities of \$19,300.00. Six years ago our congregation pledged to give \$25,000.00 a year and did it. A gradual falling off of payments resulted in the present situation. If we raised our giving to the former level we could pay off our debt in three to four years and be in excellent shape to carry the financing necessary for a new hall, which is an absolute necessity in the not too distant future. If we establish a high standard of giving for the next few years we will then have the George Michael bequest, the capital of the Hodgson Trust Estate, and perhaps some bequests for a down payment of not less than Thirty Thousand Dollars. With a good financial record as of that time we have no doubt that we could finance the balance of the cost on an amortized basis. Great problems require great efforts and we trust that with God's help St. Peter's will face up to her task.

Your support and your attendance at our Annual Meeting is an absolute necessity in order that St. Peter's may plan her progress in the future.
