ST. PETER'S CATHREDAL REPORT OF THE RECTOR - 1967

This of necessity must be a projection rather than a report. Since the announcement of the appointment by the Bishop, Mrs. Tanton and I have received nothing but kindness and encouragement from the good people of Saint Peter's. We want you to know how much this is appreciated.

SOME CONCERNS TO BE SHARED

OUR WORSHIP.

We should endeavour to make our worship pleasing to God and edifying to man. There is a great liturgical upheaval in the Church, all Christian Communions are going through a time of great change. The problem today is the same asit was at the time of the first Prayer Book and so conveniently expressed in the words of The Preface, Prefixed at the Revision of 1662; "It has been the wisdom of the Church of England, ever since the first compiling of her Public Liturgy, to keep the mean between two extremes, too much stiffness in refusing, and too much easiness in admitting any variation from it."

Due to the expansion of the city and the mobility of our congregation it may be necessary to change the hour of our Choral Eucharist to 10:00 am or 9:30 am, to be followed by Sunday School. In this way we can restore the "Family Pew"

What is the best hour for Sunday Evensong is another problem to be solved. The attendance at the weekday Celebrations of The Holy Eucharist leaves much to be desired. Day after day the laity are not represented and there is no Eucharist offered. On the occasion of the 75th anniversary, Dr. Cutbert Simpson, the preacher, "..stressed the fact that for more than fifth years the Daily Eucharist has been the centre of the devotional life of St. Peter's and reminded the congregation that it was their privelege and responsibility to build upon the foundation which had been so well laid." To change the present sad state of things it is suggested that families and individuals become responsible for attendance at the weekday Eucharist; eg the Joneses take the first Tuesday of each month.

St. Gergory's servers Guild. The Servers of the parish have been organized with regular officers. We hope that more of our boys will give themselves to this activity. We ask from parents their cooperation and encouragement. In one parish a lad said he couldn't serve because his parents objected to being awakened so early in the morning. God forgive them.

The Sunday School St. Peter's is fortunate to have a staff of capable and dovoted teachers under the direction of an enthusiastic Superintendent in the person of Mr. Arthur Holland. No doubt in the near future the question of adequate facilities for teaching will come before the attention of the parish. In the meantime we should use the facilities we have to the best advantage. There are quite a few of our children who are not in Sunday School. Here again we solicit the help of the parents. Actually it is thier responsibility to see that their child has a good religious education, The Church is here to help them.

women's work Saint Peter's has an excellent opportunity to carry on the programme of the Anglican Church Women due to their present setup. We hope that out of the present groups there will come an overall executive who will coordinate the women's work and carry on a programme of Christian Education among the women.

REPORT OF THE RECTOR CONTINUED

Saint Peter's Altar Guild has been reorganized under the leadership of Mrs. Donald E. Carruthers. These ladies care for the Altar and its furnishings as well as the Communion Linens, the Vestments of the Clergy and Servers. Each Saturday they make ready the Altar for the comming week.

100TH ANNIVERSARY In 1969 we will be celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the Opening Services on St. Peter's, June 13, 1869. On August 8th, the Choir was Surpliced. The Bishop of Nova Scotia paid his first visit on September 12th, 1869 and held the first Confirmation in Saint Peter's. It is recommended that a special committee be constituted to make suitable arrangements for a fitting observance of our 100th Anniversary.

In all our parish life we must be conscious of the fact that our task is to be the Church of Christ and the question naturally arises, "WHAT IS THE CHURCH?" The following three paragraphs are taken from a paper delivered by the Rev. C. R. Elliott, St. John's Church, Fairview, N. S., and delivered to the Atlantic Ecumenical Conference at Halifax, September 1967:

The Church is the instrument of God, a tool for performing a task. as the Body of Christ, it is called to a task in the world, as its Lord was called to a task in the world by the Incarnation. This task is nothing less than being coworkers with Christ in the building the Kingdom of God, so that it might come on earth as it is in heaven. "Preaching the Gospel" is one way of describing that work simply, unless we confine this description to the function of being a divine publicity-agent in the world, a sort of Gospel news-media. Better than "preaching the Gospel" is the more exact "Proclamation of the Gospel". Proclamation is much more than talking about the Kingdom it means setting it up, initiation it, bringing it to reality in the lives of men. After all, GOOD NEWS is the EVENT itself, not the news report of the Event.

One of the perennial problems in trying to understand the Church has been the difficulty of trying to hold in uneasy tension two almost-contracictory concepts: the extent to which it is the Kingdom of God on earth, and to what extent it is God's Instrument for building the Kingdom. To some extent this is like confusing a factory with the product that comes from it. Or confusing schools with education. Or, in Genesis concepts, it is similar to making no distinction between the work of cultivating the Garden of Eden and the pleasure of enjoying its fruit. The two ideas can be held together but it presents a very real tension in Christian thinking nevertheless.

If the Church is the Kingdom it is a divine though visible replica of Heaven, a veritable City of God, the Commonwealth of the Saved. Thus it is a Church-in-repose, an arrived-church, and its major function would be the old-fashioned world-wide missionary church-extension program of making more and more members. Baptism would be a rescuing from the City of the World into the safe haven of the City of God. A major portion of the traditional Baptism theology is based on this approach.

However it would be more satisfactory and efficient if a certain amount of money could be allocated to a Choir Fund each year so that we could budget accordingly.

The attendance at practices is a bit inconsistent and we would stress that a Choir must practice regularly if it is to maintain any degree of excellence.

We would like to thank all those who have helped us throughout the year, with a special word to our Bector, To Canon Mark Ferguson, Mrs. Blake and Mrs. Rogers and their assistants and to Mr. Ling, the Sexton.
