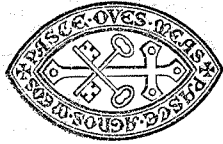

ANNUAL REPORT OF ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL, 1889-1890.

CHARLOTTETOWN, EASTER, 1890.

MY DEAR PEOPLE,—

The past year has been a somewhat uneventful one in the annals of St. Peter's, and I have therefore very little to report.

The congregation, in spite of losses by deaths and removals, has slightly increased, and the attendance at the Sunday services has been somewhat larger. I wish more of you could see your way to attend the daily services. The fact that many of you do so during Lent, shows that by an effort you could also do so at other times if you were disposed to; and did you only realize more fully our Blessed Lord's words, "Where two or three are gathered together in My name, there am I in the midst of them," you would, I am sure, try to be present, at least occasionally.

On Ash Wednesday we began a daily Celebration of the Holy Communion. So far the attendance at this service has been very good, exceeding my expectations, and I sincerely hope that we may be able to continue it the year round. Those who have felt the benefit of that quiet half hour of worship during Lent, would surely be loathe to give it up at Easter.

The Memorial Chapel has been open for services since November, and has been a great comfort and convenience in many ways, besides saving a considerable sum for fuel and gas. The difficulty of keeping it warm on very cold days, will, I think, be obviated when the inside roof is finished. It is free from debt, the total receipts exceeding the expenditure by just one cent. A good deal of money is still required to complete the interior, and the Treasurer (Hon. T. H. Haviland) will be glad to receive offerings for that purpose.

The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia made his biennial visitation to the Church last summer, and was pleased to approve of everything he inspected, but he expressed a hope that steps would soon be taken to obtain a house for the Priest-Incumbent. This is a matter for *your* consideration. I cannot move in it, as it is quite unpleasant enough for me to be constantly asking for money for other objects, without asking for myself.

The Rev. Fred. E. J. Lloyd has resigned his position as Assistant Priest, and leaves us next June. The work at St. Peter's, in addition to the entire charge of Georgetown and Cherry Valley, is too arduous for one man, if done conscientiously, and however much we may have wished it, I suppose we could not expect him to remain with us much longer. The Rev. T. H. Hunt has been priested, and will continue as Assistant and Master in the School.

The death of Mrs. E. J. Hodgson, last October, was a great shock to us all, and will be felt for a long time to come. Associated with the Church from its very beginning, the welfare of St. Peter's was the great object of her life—time, money, labor and prayers were all expended freely by her for that purpose. A constant sufferer herself, she was always ready to sympathise with others in sickness or sorrow; and many in pain and trouble and poverty will now miss the presence of her who was wont to comfort and soothe them. Her patience, gentleness and unselfishness caused her to be beloved by all who knew her; but the possession, in an eminent degree, of that charity which "thinketh no evil," was the crowning glory of her life. By her will she bequeathed \$500 for the improvement of St. Peter's, \$50 for the poor, and \$1000 to be invested for the general purposes of the Church. The response made to the suggestion for subscriptions for a Reredos to be erected in the chapel to her memory was most gratifying, and the work will be completed at Easter. *Requiescat in pace.*

Our condition, financially, is satisfactory, as you will see by the Treasurer's Report. Although a large sum has been expended on repairs and improvements, we have incurred no debt, and had all the envelope holders fulfilled their obligations we should have some \$148 to go on with. Is it too much to expect Christian men and women to pay the money they have promised to God? Should it not be the first instead of the last debt to be discharged? And if payments were made regularly every week there would be no trouble; but there are those who always put off settlement till the last week in the year, and then frequently, from some cause or other, they are unable to pay.

May I ask you again, to be a little more considerate in

the matter of parish visits? I get round to see you all as often as I can, and each family is visited three or four times a year. I really cannot undertake more than this, and it certainly does not add to the pleasure of a call to be reminded in a reproachful tone that it was a long time since I was there before. In the matter of sick visits, too, some of you are very exacting. A cold in the head or neuralgia, even if it confines you to the house for a week, does not necessitate a visit from the priest; and if you do require me, it is a very simple matter to send and let me know, instead of waiting until you are well, and then looking injured the first time you meet me, because you feel that you have been neglected.

The various Guilds and Societies have held meetings regularly and done steady work.

The Rev. James Dixon, Sec'y-General of the C. B. S., paid us a visit last summer and addressed the Ward here. The work of the Confraternity is being re-organized in Canada, and I have been appointed Canadian Provincial Superior.

The Sewing Society held a Fancy Sale last June, and has executed a good many orders. It now meets every Thursday afternoon in the Schoolroom. More might attend these meetings, I think. The old complaint was that it was too far to walk to the other end of the town, but now that difficulty is removed the attendance is no larger.

The Girls' Sewing Society has held several sales of second hand clothing, and displays a good deal of energy in various undertakings. One pleasing feature is that it devotes part of its funds to Domestic and Foreign Missions, an example I would gladly see the other Societies follow.

The Band of Hope gave a theatrical entertainment in February, which was so successful that it had to be repeated. Great credit is due to Miss Harris, who trained the children in their parts.

The Boys' Brass Band have devoted the money they earned during the last two years to fitting up a new room in the School, which is used for various meetings.

A Church Institute has been formed, as a Men's Club. This meets in the Schoolroom every Wednesday evening. Games, papers and periodicals are provided. It is hoped that this will be the means of making the men of the congregation take a little more interest in the affairs of the Church.

The Graceland Society was started to take charge of St. Peter's Cemetery, and as there is sufficient money on hand it is intended to make a great many improvements to the grounds this spring. A statement of its objects and rules will be found on another page.

The Sunday School is flourishing, and the number of scholars is slightly larger than last year. The children continue to support the Indian child at Yale, B. C.

The Day Schools are doing good work, and we hope several boys will matriculate at King's College at the end of the term; and several girls are preparing for the entrance examination at Prince of Wales College in August.

Altogether, I think we have great cause for thankfulness. The work is progressing on all sides, old prejudices against Catholic doctrine and Catholic Ritual are dying out, and would soon come to an end altogether, if we would be more earnest in making our lives conform with our professions. Let us, therefore, while we ask the Author and Giver of all good things for future blessings, not forget to thank Him for all past mercies to us.

WANTS.

The most pressing wants this year are, a purple silk Chasuble, Choir Stalls and gifts to complete the interior of the Chapel.

THE GRAVEYARD SOCIETY.

OBJECTS.—To improve the condition of the graveyard. To care for graves of strangers and the friendless. To undertake care of graves for relatives.

MEMBERS.—Any one accepted by vote at annual meeting, or by executive appointed at that annual meeting.

HONORARY MEMBERS pay an annual fee of \$1.00, and enjoy all the privileges of active members.

ACTIVE MEMBERS pay an annual fee of 25 cents, and perform work in the graveyard, and under the direction and supervision of executive.

NOTE.—An active member neglecting the work undertaken, or failing to have it done by a substitute, shall at the end of the year be considered, as in honor bound, to pay the fee of an honorary member, unless notice shall have been given of inability, when the fee paid (25 cents) will be refunded if required.

WORK.—The Society undertakes:—

1. To have graves properly sodded for the following fees :—Adult's grave, \$1.00. Child's grave (under 10 years) 50 cents.
 2. To care for graves at following rates :—An adult's grave, \$1.00. Child's grave (under 10 years) 50 cents. per annum.
 3. These fees to be paid in advance. They will be refunded if the work be not faithfully done.
 4. The earnings of the Society are devoted to improving the condition of the graveyard, and to paying the Sexton for caring for graves which members cannot attend to.
- Further particulars may be obtained from the officers of the Society.

At a meeting held pursuant of notice given in church, this Society was formally organized, and the proceedings of previous informal meetings were confirmed. The Society now consists of twelve active and five honorary members. Although organized late in the season, the Society has been instrumental in having upwards of thirty graves cared for, thirteen of which have been paid for out of the funds of the Society. The graveyard has been ploughed preparatory to being laid down in lawn, and other improvements contemplated.

CHURCH WARDEN'S REPORT.

To the Congregation of St. Peter's Cathedral,—

The past year has been financially very satisfactory, for, notwithstanding the unusual demand for special repairs, the Church Wardens have been furnished with a slightly larger amount to meet the ordinary expenses. While special collections and offerings are \$615.80 in excess of those of last year, the amount for missions having increased by 20 per cent. the total amount of these gifts is \$2,209.77. Although there has been more effort to pay up envelope contributions, there is still a balance of \$148.34 owing, and it is to be hoped that incoming Church Wardens will have a larger number of envelope holders to depend upon, and that, in addition to the increased income from this source, the general collections will be much more generous, for the expenditure for the past year for ordinary purposes has been unusually small. It should also be borne in mind that in 1888 the envelopes fell behind nearly \$100, and that the ground then lost has not been recovered, nor have the general collections increased.

The east end has been painted, in keeping with the other walls of the Chancel. The organ has been tuned and two sets of pipes from the old organ have been added, thereby supplying two of the three vacant stops, and turning to account upwards of \$200 worth of property otherwise useless. But the main work of the past year appears in the accounts under the item Special Repairs. For some unaccountable reason, the Church had never had eaves projecting sufficiently to carry the rainwater away from the walls, hence there has been a gradual process of destruction going on. This defect has been remedied by the very prompt and generous response to the appeal made last Easter, and the walls and roof are now in perfect repair. From the same fund new outbuildings have been provided, and the Chancel in the Schoolroom has been transformed into a large well-lighted classroom. By the generosity of the Sewing Society the balance due on the boiler has been paid. The heating apparatus under the Sacristy, has been removed under the Chapel, and now heats both places, as well as the new Sacristy built in connection with the Chapel. The ordinary demands of the Church have been fully met.

The Church Wardens return thanks to Mr. Arch. Irwin as envelope clerk, to the accountants for their assistance, to Mr. W. C. Harris for his plans and painstaking supervision of the building improvements during the year, and to Mr. W. L. Strickland for his very thorough work in securing the fund for Special Repairs and Improvements.
