THE RECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT - 1969

The Wardens, Vestry and Parishioners of the Cathedral Church of Saint Peter, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island

GREETINGS:

This year the Rector's Report must begin with a very personal note of thanksgiving that due to the mercy of God and the great kindness of the people of Saint Peter's I am able to give this report in person. Mrs. Tanton and I sincerely thank the many parishioners for the trip to Florida where we spent three weeks at the Selby Motel and two weeks as the guests of Canon and Mrs. H. D. Smith. Canon Mark Ferguson carried on the priestly ministrations in the parish and we are most grateful to him for his continuing assistance. We learned with sorrow of the death of our good friend Canon Smith on October 5th. The Cross on the nave of the Cathedral destroyed by lightning in August was replaced by the present Cross, a memorial to Canon Smith erected through the generosity of his wife, Ellen Bungay Smith.

CANON E. M. MALONE, D.D., D.C.L. Honourary Assistant Priest.

This year for the first time the Diocesan Synod issued Certificates of RECOGNITION OF SERVICE to Priests who had given long years of faithful service in the Priesthood. The Bishop in his Charge to Synod said, "The first certificate goes to the Reverend Canon Elwin Mortimer Malone of Charlottetown, who was ordained to the Priesthood on February 26th, 1906, and therefore has been a Priest for more than sixty-three years. We send special congratulations and good wishes from the Synod to him." In which the Parishioners of Saint Peter's join with happy accord and give thanks for his continued presence and inspiration in our midst.

P. E. ISLAND DEANERY LAY READERS' COURSE

Another first on the Island was the course for Lay Readers held at Saint Mary's, Summerside, under the direction of the Rural Dean, Rev. R. C. Tuck. This course will be given over a period of three years and will qualify those attending to be licensed as Diocesan Lay Readers. Two men from St. Peter's were able to attend this year, LCDR R. A. Orton and Dr. Karl Winter.

OUR CENTENNIAL OBSERVATIONS

The high light of our parish life in our Centennial Year was the opening and dedication of our Christian Education Centre on June 22nd. What a pleasure it was to have Canon Malone bless the Centre and our oldest parishioner, Mrs. Eardley Hyndman, cut the ribbon to officially mark the opening. The Centre is proving a great blessing to our Sunday School Teachers and children. We are sure that as time goes on we will be making greater use of these facilities on weekdays. More details concerning the Centre will be given in the Wardens' and Sunday School Reports. Here I want to pay a word of tribute to Mr. Arthur Holland and his faithful band

of Sunday School Teachers for the excellent work they are doing.

We were privileged to have both our Bishops and Dean E. B. N. Cochran, of All Saints' Cathedral, Halifax, who preached bringing us greetings from the Diocese of Nova Scotia and the Mother Church.

We were happy to have the Clergy of the Deanery and the Members of the Choir Camp sing Evensong in the Cathedral when Captain Ronald Walker, C.A. preached the sermon. Mr. Mark LeRoux was Director and Mr. Christopher Gledhill, organist. We are grateful to all who participated and look forward to this becoming at least an annual event.

The Centennial Observances will continue with the visit of Professor Baker, President of the University of P. E. I., who will speak at the Men's Breakfast on January 25th and the visit of Mr. Jack Tattrie, Theological Student of King's College, who will speak on "Theological Education Sunday" February 8th. Saint Peter's has always been concerned for education. In the early days the first Priest, Rev. George Hodgson established a day school to prepare boys for University Matriculation. This school operated until 1907. The kindergarten and primary sections continued on into the Twenties. This year we were happy to congratulate nine of our Young People who received academic degrees, a remarkable number from such a small congregation.

It was our great desire to have Dr. Cuthbert M. Simpson, Dean of Christ Church, Oxford, England, and a son of the parish, to preach in August as part of our Centennial Observances. His presence would have brought into focus the outstanding contribution his family and that of his Mother have made to the life of Saint Peter's from the time his Father Canon James Simpson was inducted as the second Incumbent of Saint Peter's. Dr. Simpson died at Oxford on June 30th, 1969, full of honours and achievements and after a life of much blessing to the Church and his fellow man.

ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS AND CHURCH UNION

Conversations between the Anglican and United Churches are progressing at the top level but there seems to be little concern at the local level. We did have a visit of the two Executive Commissioners on Church Union during the year but the attendance was poor. The local Committee for the Island has met once and plans several sessions for 1970. The two Churches are committed to prepare a plan for union to be submitted to their constituents for study and action. The climate has changed so rapidly in the past few years that the emphasis seems to be on "Christian Unity" rather than organic "Church Union".

A movement is underway to form a Local Council of Churches for P. E. Island. Membership is open to all Christians. It is of great interest that Roman Catholics in the Archdiocese of Halifax (which includes P. E. I.) are now permitted to belong to the Council of Churches. Already on P. E. Island much progress has been made in Christian Unity through the Inter-faith groups in West Prince, Summerside and Charlottetown.

COMMUNITY CONCERNS

The hearings of the Senatorial Committee on Poverty and the Canadian Inter-faith report on Coalition for Development have brought to light some of the problems facing our people in P. E. Island. There are pockets of acute poverty and poor housing conditions in P. E. Island as revealed by the Panel Discussion at the Semi-Annual Meeting of the D. C. S. The Poverty Committee in Charlottetown has brought to our attention that there are no provincial regulations regarding standards for rental housing and has challenged us to action: (i) To urge Government to provide or assist in providing additional low rental housing and (ii) to urge the Provincial Government to proclaim a set of standards for low rental housing. The other problem was the deplorable condition of our jails, which condition for years has been brought to the attention of the Government and the public by the reports of the Grand Juries, without any discernable action. As your Rector I would urge you to support the efforts of the "Grey Knights" in their crusade to improve jail conditions and the efforts being made to make the process of justice more readily available to poor people.

The D. C. S. hopes to sponsor with the assistance of the appropriate welfare agencies a nursery school in western Prince County by using the church property at Inverness.

If you think there is no poverty on Prince Edward Island the following statistics will give grounds for further thought. There are 20,000 people (3,000 plus families) receiving direct welfare assistance. There are 1,000 War Veterans receiving allowances (representing about 3,000 persons). These figures do not include those receiving Old Age Pensions or Family Allowances.

We are grateful to the many parishioners of Saint Peter's who are active in civic, community, social and educational affairs.

In closing I take this opportunity to thank all who are fellow workers with me and without whose aid little could be accomplished, for their prayers, support, cooperation and good works. In particular a special word of appreciation to Canon Ferguson, Capt. Ronald Walker, Paul Kays and Bev. Armstrong, (our Lay Readers), Dr. H. H. Kelly and Mr. D. E. Carruthers, Church Wardens, Mr. Ed Acorn, Vestry Clerk, the Members of the Parish Vestry, Miss Brenton, Organist, Mrs. Gwen Patterson, Choir Director, the Members of the Choir, The Servers, The Altar Guild, Mr. Holland and the Sunday School Teachers, Mr. Wm. Ling, our faithful Sexton, the Leaders of our Parish Organizations and Youth Groups.

PROPERTY WARDEN'S REPORT - JAN 18TH 1970

It was one year ago at our annual meeting that you, as a congregation gave final approval of our plans to construct class rooms in the basement of the Church. Our work was outlined and we got on with the job. There were a multitude of small decisions to be made on your behalf and with the guidance of the Property Committee these decisions were made and most have turned out to be correct. There were various alterations, as to detail, that necessitated a close observation of the construction. Your warden and committee looked after these. The construction was completed behind schedule but in due course we had the official opening which was a great success.

During the summer our church was struck with lightning. The Cross on the north end of the church was shattered and the sump pump motor was burned out. Also one of the motors in our heating plant was damaged. These were all fixed and the cross replaced.

We attempted to correct hot water shortage at the time of our Annual Tea and felt we had it corrected. We found that the ladies, at this time, do use an excessive amount of hot water and even though our hot water system now is a combination of electrical and steam conversion it does not have a fast enough recovery to allow for a continuous full tap of hot water.

Chimneys on the Rochford Square house had to be repaired and now we may have to replace roofing on Canon Malone's side. The garage roof that is associated with the Rochford Square property has to be re-roofed this summer. It is now fixed temporarily. We have had our water pipes (under the kitchen) freeze lately, and repair work to the sills, under the kitchen, has to be carried out this coming summer.

We now have property we should be proud to own and maintain. It is hoped work carried out on your behalf is satisfactory.

FINANCIAL WARDEN'S

1969 BUDGET REPORT

I submit overleaf a statement of receipts and expenditures for the year of 1969, together with a budget for 1970. I have made some changes in the bookkeeping setup but believe the statements are self-explanatory, but if not, I should welcome questions from the floor. You will note receipts from envelope giving was \$3,400 less than budgeted for last year, and if we are to meet our expenses, this much must be received in 1970; and if we are to make any progress toward reduction, the budget must be exceeded. The increase necessary is only 15%, and I think you will agree this is not large and a larger increase is possible. Since my 1968 report, the long-dreamed conversion of the Church basement to Sunday School rooms has become reality and I think you will agree it is something the people of St. Peters can be proud of. I will be amiss if I do not at this time draw special attention to my fellow warden, Dr. Kelly, and his committee who have given unsparingly of their time and effort to insure a successful project. At time of writing, the final costs had not been tabulated and Dr. Kelly will likely comment on this in his report.

In preparing the budget for 1970, I have tried to be as realistic as possible and as mentioned above, the 15% increase budgeted for 1970 will have no impact on our debt and I think you will agree this is not good enough, and our givings must be further increased.

Let us all stop and meditate.

Something to think about, isn't it.



We are particularly grateful this year to have been able to move into the new facilities in the basement of the Cathedral, which have become a reality through the efforts of the Vestry and Congregation.

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THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GIRLS' AUXILIARY OF SAINT
PETER'S CATHEDRAL, FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31ST, 1969

The Girls' Auxiliary commenced meetings very enthusiastically on January 13th, 1969, with 16 members in attendance, but by October our membership had decreased to eight and by the year's end the group consisted of six members. This is very discouraging for the leaders! Surely there must be a number of girls between 12 - 16 who should be members of this Church group!

Corporate Communion was held on a number of occasions and a special World Day of Prayer Service was held in the Cathedral on March 2nd at 7.00 P. M. Captain Ronald Walker conducted the Service, assisted by Mr. H. B. Armstrong, also participating in the Service were members of St. Paul's G. A. and their leaders; the G. A. Secretary, Mrs. Reg MacKinnon; our Sunday School superintendent, Mr. Arthur Holland, as well as a large congregation of parents and friends. The collection from this Service, which amounted to \$16.00, was forwarded to the Women's Inter-Church Council of Canada, along with a letter which had been requested concerning the form of Church Service conducted, number in attendance, etc.

Early in March I attended a week-end G. A. Conference in Tatamagouche, N. S., as one of the four delegates from Prince Edward Island. We were fortunate in having Mrs Hazel Donaldson take an active part in the panel discussion and other sessions, and the Girls were charmed with her pleasing personality. The Girls are grateful to the Anglican Church Women of the Prince Edward Island Deanery who sponsored this Conference and especially to the members of St. Peter's Guild who provided the delicious lunch and the Sunday morning breakfast which followed the Corporate Communion Service at St. Peter's Cathedral.

Activities of our G. A. group during the past year included preparing and mailing boxes of used stamps to the Sisters of St. John the Divine; assisting with St. Paul's G. A. in the annual collection for the Retarded Children, making afghans and handcrafts for the Grandma's attic Sale, as well as taking full charge of the Candy and Book table at that time, assisting with the Altar Guild at Easter and Christmas and at our Centennial Tea and Bazaar, selling their handwork and other small items on the popular G. LITTLE HELPERS DEPARTMENT AND FAMILY LIFE

It is always a pleasure to call on the mothers of St. Peter's Little Helpers each year. They make me so welcome. There are 58 children, seven and under, from 35 families. This shows a steady decrease since 1965 when there were 88 children in this age group. The annual party on November 6th, was a noisy success. We are grateful to the Afternoon and Evening Branches for their help on party day, and to the G. A.s who helped entertain the children during the afternoon. The money from the mite boxes was given to Mrs DeBlois, Diocesan Secretary.

There have been three Family Life meetings to date this year. Last winter's speakers gave us an insight into problem community topics. This winter, our programme is designed to teach parents of children in the Little Helpers age group through to teenagers how to cope with the many problems that face us today.

Interesting speakers have talked to us on subjects pertaining to these problems and have given us their viewpoints to better help us in our family life and sustain a happy Christian home.

The mothers in this Family Life group supervise a creche on Sunday mornings that provides facilities for the care of toddlers, three and under, during the 10.00 A. M. service. To date, only one family has taken advantage of the creche. We would be pleased to care for more children at this time so that husbands and wives might worship together.

Last Spring the Family Life mothers catered to the Grandma's Attic Sale.

Family Life meetings will be held on the third Thursday of the month from now to May.
