MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING
ST. PETERS CATHEDRAL
JANUARY 25TH. 1981

There were 54 Parishioners in attendance.

Father Westin opened the meeting with prayers.

A minute of silence was observed in memory Dr. Hammond Kelly

A thank you was extended to the ladies for the splendid supper.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were adopted as printed in the Annual Report.

Rectors Report. Father Westin drew attention to page 8 in the Annual Report. this was the Mission by St. Andrews Missionary Society of King's College and Our Patronal Festival, which will take the form of a Theological Conference. Father Westin moved the adoption of his report. seconded by Bayliss Lee. Carried.

St. Peters Publication. Father Westin reported that pamphlets are being printed from time to time for distribution to the parishioners. The first one is due shortly.

Ron Frid spoke on the Boys Club, he said that the leaders of this project spent approximately \$300.00 of their own funds to keep it operating. He was wondering if there was some way this could be financed by the parish.

The incoming Vestry were to look into this matter of the boys club.

Christian Education. It was reported that 64 were enrolled in 8 classes.

There was a discussion on the problems with our Christian Education Program.

It was reported that the teachers did not know each other, also they did not know how many children were actually attending Church School.

Eileen Paton reported that some of the children were not arriving on time for Church School.

Ron Frid said that he was not in favor of the children not being with their parents for the full Church Service each Sunday. He felt Church School should be held at a different time than the Church Service.

Mrs Bev Armstrong felt the Church School should be held at 2 p.m. on each Sunday.

David Whittlesay asked what really is a good time for Church School. He said we should stand up for God or forget it.

Keir Costain said that the parents of the children must be willing to work on the Church School problem, otherwise it will not work.

George Vessey suggested that the Church School should start after the Sermon.

MOTION: Art Peake moved that the incoming Vestry appoint a Committee to meet with the teachers and find out what are the problems in the Church School Program, and that such Committee work hard to correct the problems. Seconded by Ron Orton. Carried.

Professor Alan Reesor spoke on the intelligence of the Junior Choir, he was quite proud and pleased with them.

Father Westin spoke on the responsibilities of the parents etc. Where are the Confirmed people, etc.

Ron Frid was commenting on the high cost of heating the Church Property. He said that it was possible to obtain a grant from the Government to aid in this cost. The Property Committee was to look into this. Ron reported that he would give particulars he had to Jean Peake.

Charles MacKeen asked why there was no budget for Rochford Square Property. This was explained by the Finance Warden.

Day Care Centre. Norma Simpson reported that the Day Care Centre located in the Rochford Square Property will have all the utilities in their name. A meeting on this will be held with the Vestry in February.

Bev Armstrong spoke on the Protestant Family Service Bureau.

Regina Korrey asked why the Protestant Family Service Bureau needed help.

Mrs Rogers Sr. asked why do we have to help other groups when we have to look after ourselves. She felt we should look after St. Peters and let the rest look after themselves.

Art Peake gave a vote of thanks to the Vestry for their good work during the year.

During 1981 we had a Mission conducted by members of St. Andrew's Missionary Society of King's College, Halifax. We are most grateful to them, and to The Rev'd Dr. R.A. Ward who led their Bible Study Group and was always available for guidance. The enthusiasm of these students, as well as their obvious sincerity, did much to encourage and stir us up.

Several of our faithful and beloved members left us, and the Church Militant, in 1981. They will be sadly missed. We pray that they may rest in peace.

It is with regret that I must point out that we have not grown in numbers. However, I do believe that there are indications of spiritual growth. The way in which the Cathedral Family responded to the financial crisis we faced in the Fall is most encouraging. The number of young people out at Midnight Mass, and the sense of worship, cannot but encourage us all. Also, the formation of a Mother's Union speaks well for the future. We must foster and support family life. The family is the basic unit of society. If we are to have a strong and healthy society, then we must build solid, Christian families which manifest love for God and for each other. Love is costly. "There is nothing love cannot face; there is no limit to its faith, its hope, and its endurance."

Our appreciation, once again, to Alan Reesor and our choir. They continue to lead us in the worship of Almighty God, lifting praise and adoration to the Majesty on High with truth, sincerity and the beauty of holiness. As the first duty of man is the worship of God, it is only right that we continue to lay great stress on Liturgy, and to strive to make it as glorious and as uplifting as possible.

Our Theological Conference - tied in with the annual Patronal Festival - was very well received, as was the "Conference Report." In a small way it is a valuable contribution to the Church Catholic.

In November, the Synod of the Diocese of Nova Scotia elected Father Arthur Peters, of Christ Church, Sydney, to be Bishop Coadjutor. It is expected that he will be consecrated in February. We wish him every blessing in this new ministry, and assure him of our prayers and support. Bishop Hatfield, as Diocesan, continues to exercise Episcopal Jurisdiction over all Anglicans in Prince Edward Island.

It is essential that we, as Christians, be alert and vigilant. Our adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, is rampant. We must be on the alert. Observe what is happening in the world, our nation and locally. We have a witness to bear and a warfare to wage. Regular, persistent prayer is a powerful weapon. We must use it. The faith "once delivered" to the saints is in danger, overseas as well as in Canada. We must also be prepared to stand up, if necessary alone, where this is required.

Father John Pearce will be with us for the Ash Wednesday Quiet Day in 1982.

In 1982 may each one of you grow spiritually; get to know and love God better; respond to His call in obedience and thanksgiving; pray for the coming of God and His Kingdom, and work for it.

PROPERTY WARDENS REPORT

Father Westin, Vestry Members and Parishioners of St. Peters Cathedral Church, I have the honour to submit the following property report for the year 1981.

This has been a difficult year. A survey of the property early in the year, using as much professional advice as possible, revealed that the actual Church building required very large expenditures of money to bring it to an acceptable standard.

In June a report was presented to the Vestry detailing the immediate and long range maintenance required. The Vestry approved these expenditures. The report was presented to the Congregation at the family day in September, and as a result of the response, work was commenced.

The following items have been completed:-

Driveway - Widened to 20 ft. patched and surfaced.

The roof over the steps to the Sunday School rooms was leaking very badly, so the tar was removed, flashing replaced and retarred.

In December the Vestry approved the installation of ceiling fans in the nave and choir of the Cathedral. These fans are most efficient, giving considerable comfort to the congregation with less use of the furnace.

The objective of the property committee has been to stop the flow of water into the building and to raise the standard of the appearance of the Church building and grounds.

Fortunately considerable work has been carried out on the Rectory and Parish House, so that both of these properties are at the moment in good condition, but it must be remembered that they both have old furnaces and the original plumbing, which could cause us heavy expenditure at any time.

Mr. Haddad was sick for a considerable part of this year, 4 1/2 months, and left us on December 31st. We welcome our new caretaker Mr. Don Osbourne.

It is recommended that the following work be carried out to Church buildings without delay in order to stop further deterioration of the fabric.

Church Hall	-	Exterior Painting
Church Building	-	New flashing, new down pipes
	-	Repoint brick work

- Stop water in the bell tower
- Raise front entrance path
- Landscape to allow surface drainage away from building

The following work will have to be carried out over the next few years.

- Redecorate the Cathedral
- Replace stonework on exterior of Chapel
- Replace tiling in Sunday School rooms
- Redecorate Hall
- Replace the furnace

I particularly wish to thank the various members of the congregation who have so willingly helped to clean the Church, all the members of the Property Committee who have willingly assisted and advised me. I am aware that it is not correct to single out one person, however I must bring to your attention the particular efforts of Dr. Alan Reesor.

Alan undertook the task of maintaining the cleanliness of the interior of the buildings, and has supervised, and on many occasions, actually cleaned the church and hall himself. I doubt if there have been many Saturdays this year when Alan has not spent the whole day cleaning the property.

I will close this report with one matter for consideration by the congregation.

It is my opinion, in view of the potential costs with which we will be faced, that St. Peters Cathedral cannot afford the luxury of being in the Real Estate business, and that serious thought should be given to selling the duplex on Rochford Square.

I do not suggest this be done immediately, but rather at a time when property values have recovered.

This property is old, and will continually require expensive repairs.

The apartment over the hall could then be renovated for the use of the caretaker.

FINANCE WARDEN'S REPORT FOR 1981

The Financial Statements of the Church's Revenue and Expenditures, the Statements of the Trust Funds, and the Budget for 1982 are set out in the following pages.

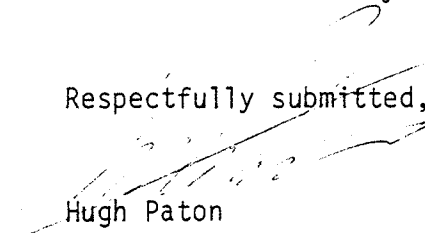
It is a pleasure to be able to tell you that our Building Fund Debt has been nearly wiped out due to the generous giving of the people of St. Peter's and the dedicated efforts of many people including Peggy Holland, George Kays, the Binney Group and the many others who worked tirelessly for the Annual Bazaar and Supper, the Men's Association, and several bequests.

Our total Building Fund Debt (excluding the mortgage on 15 Rochford Square) has been reduced from \$43,000. to \$ 2,919 as of January 15, 1982. This decrease will save us approximately \$7,500. this year in bank interest.

However, we still have a bank overdraft of \$6,761. in our General Operating Account. In order to eliminate this, we need to increase our weekly giving during 1982 by approximately 17%. In other words, if you are now giving, for example, \$20. per week, this should be increased immediately to \$23.40 and if everyone of us did this we would be able to get rid of this overdraft and put the church's finances in a very healthy state.

I would like to express my gratitude and appreciation to Alan MacMillan for acting as Auditor, to Fred Weatherby our Treasurer for his many hours on our behalf, to Elizabeth and Ted Reagh for their help with the monthly statements and to Bayliss Lee and Maurice Blake of the Finance Committee.

JANUARY 1981 - DECEMBER 1981

It was our privilege to serve as Co-Chairmen of Binney Group this year. We thank God for our many talented, energetic members without whom our job would not have been successful.

We held regular bi-monthly meetings from January to May and met weekly from September to December to prepare handcrafts for the Bazaar with only one business meeting a month. Every regular meeting is preceded by Vespers in the Chapel.

Our Annual Bazaar and Dinner, which although co-ordinated by Binney members, is truly a Parish affair. No one on the Parish list is missed at this time. We both met and got to know many members of the congregation who were previously only names to us. This is truly the meeting-place for 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. worshippers and much fellowship is enjoyed by all. Bazaar time is a busy and sometimes nerve-wracking time and at times we wondered whether it would come about or not, but on the actual day everyone went about her own tasks with such competence that we found ourselves with virtually nothing to do.

The past year has also seen the opening of the Rochford Street Child Care Centre in the Church House, with the usual growing pains. Since its beginning, we have heard many favourable comments on the quality of care provided there. Although we have contributed little in actual work or money our support has made it possible for this Centre to operate. Our involvement in this has made many people aware of St. Peter's outreach into the community. The staff at the Child Care Centre have given their half of the house a face-lift inside and out at their own expense, improving it greatly. We cannot help but benefit from our support of this facility.

Every week fudge is made and sold to various outlets in the City. The money from this project and the bottle collections is put into the Heritage Fund. This fund has paid for the complete repair and restoration of the Stained Glass windows in the Church and Chapel and will continue to build for future needs of the Church.

Other activities in which we have been involved are: providing Sunday coffee hours; monthly Christian Council dinners; Simnel Cakes for Mothering Sunday; catered to Mens' Club breakfast twice; provided luncheon for D.C.S.; provided coffee twice daily for Theological Conference and fed Choir Camp members for two days. We also held two mammoth fudge sales; a Bake Sale at Confereration Court Mall; two Rummage Sales and an Anything-Everything Sale. We also provide the Penitential Lunch and Seder Meal.

All women of the Anglican Faith are automatically members of the A.C.W. and we welcome all who wish to join us at our meetings which, despite all our work, provide some good fellowship.

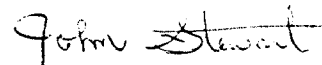
A special thanks to the men who helped to keep the church clean from time-to-time during the year and especially when Nick Haddad was hospitalized.

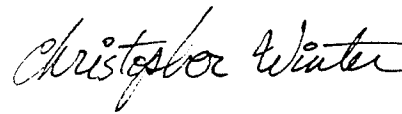
ANNUAL REPORT 1982

Sign of the FISH Movement
Annual Report
1980-1981

The Sign of the FISH has continued to provide help and support to those who request it. What help is given and how it is given is reviewed frequently and changes made sometimes because of changes in community resources but often because ways are seen to improve the service.

The hours of operation have remained the same, i.e., 2:00 to 11:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday. So far, there is no evidence that there is a great need for service outside these hours. This volunteer work requires dedication and perseverance. Sometimes a volunteer becomes discouraged because, for a while, few or perhaps no phone calls are received but then many and various calls come in - calls which test ones knowledge, imagination, and communication skills and sometimes the ability to remain calm when faced with a crisis. Then the volunteer's enthusiasm is restored by the awareness of being there when needed. Unfortunately, some resign because a lull lasted for, what was seen as, a long time. Some leave because they find their commitment interferes with home responsibilities. Recently, we were saddened by the death of a former, faithful volunteer, Louise Haszard.

Fortunately, there is a core of people who have been with the FISH Movement since it began or shortly after and so there is stability while recruitment and training of new volunteers goes on. We are always looking and trying out new ways to attract volunteers.

The training received by the volunteers is thorough and of such high calibre that, in the past year, two organizations have requested assistance in training their workers. The same three experienced people have been involved in the training program ever since the need for training was recognized. Periodic review of their work has made it possible to maintain a high level of performance.

The office committee faces many difficulties in drawing up a monthly schedule for the telephone volunteers. To try to ensure that someone is on duty at all times is a demanding job since volunteers get sick, go on vacation, or have sudden emergencies of their own. This committee maintains the file of resources so must be alert to new services or changes in services offered by long established organizations.

A concentrated effort to improve publicity resulted in more calls and more of a serious nature. People in trouble need to be reminded that FISH is concerned and how to contact the organization. This is done through the media. Publicity throughout the Maritimes was made available when ATV contacted FISH and did an interview. Speakers are available on request and information is provided to students for school projects. A booth at Confederation Court Mall on Volunteer Awareness Day, 1 May 1981, was attractively decorated by volunteers.

The churches have continued to give their support in prayers, notices in bulletins, and by providing space for meetings.

We have been fortunate, too, in the continued financial help from service clubs and individual donors. This provides for ordinary expenses but not for printing, which is done without charge, nor for the use of an office which is rent free.

FISH has so many friends without whom it would be impossible to function and for whom we are most grateful.

The members of the executive spend much time and energy to keep the work running smoothly.

Much has been said about the telephone volunteers, perhaps because there are approximately 50 of them, but also because they are the front line people who are in direct contact with the individual requiring a service. But there are other volunteers who provide essential services. Some are available to provide transportation for those who cannot afford it or who need the support of the driver if a stressful appointment must be kept. Other volunteers are called upon to visit a caller, write letters, read to someone with a vision problem, pick up and deliver medicines or groceries. A number of professional people volunteer their services to give direction in their field of work. One service that is not used is the Daily Hello, but it is available.

The Sign of the FISH is indebted to all the volunteers. I sometimes think they must have in their minds the Prayer of St. Francis of Assisi -

Lord, Make me an Instrument of Your Peace!
Where there is hatred, let me sow love;
Where there is injury, pardon;
Where there is doubt, faith;
Where there is despair, hope;
Where there is darkness, light;
Where there is sadness, joy.

O Divine Master, Grant That I May Not so Much Seek
To be consoled, as to console;
To be understood, as to understand;
To be loved, as to love;

For it is in giving that we receive;
It is in pardoning, that we are pardoned;

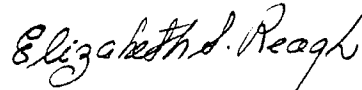

The Annual Meeting of this branch of the Canadian Bible Society was held in February, 1980 in Charlottetown at the Zion Presbyterian Church and was chaired by the District President, The Reverend Edward P. Benoit. The meeting learned that the problems of the Book Store, caused by the expropriation of the old building by the Department of Veterans' Affairs, were over and the Book Store was operating nicely at 135 Kent Street. At that meeting our rector, Canon W.H. Westin and Theodore Reagh, the Bookstore Treasurer, were re-elected as officers for the year 1981. The Reverend Edward P. Benoit was elected for a further year as President of the District. The General Secretary for the Bible Society, Dr. Kenneth G. McMillan, gave a stirring address on World Bible Society happenings.

The members at this year's annual meeting are going to have to deal with a serious issue regarding the continuation of the operation of the present Book Store as a commercial venture. This is an issue each District in Canada will have to consider during 1982. Interested Bible Society members should attend this annual meeting and make their views known.

The Canadian Bible Society is involved in at least 500 Scripture translation projects around the world. The Scriptures appear in a new language every two weeks. For this work \$3,500,000.00 is required each year. This year the sum of some \$64,000.00 was collected from Islanders. We continue to lead throughout the world in our per capita contributions.

PROTESTANT FAMILY SERVICE BUREAU -- 1981

The Protestant Family Service Bureau, in its role as a Family Life Resource Centre, is committed to the protection, enhancement, and strengthening of family life. As the social service arm of the Protestant Churches, we are dedicated to serving the needs of individuals and families and to improving both environmental and social welfare conditions in the community.

Programs and Services:

Individual, marital and family counselling.
Counselling for single parents.
Credit Counselling.
Foster care and adoptive placements.
Consultations: Counselling and Family Life Education.
Advocacy for families (Social Action).
Ladies' Auxiliary Services: Clothing room, Dental program, Christmas Shop.

The year 1981 has been one of much activity for the professional staff and Board members of the Protestant Family Service Bureau. Through counselling, family advocacy (social action), and community development services, we have been able to help various individuals, couples, and families to cope with differing kinds of emotional, and social problems. An overview of our activities on your behalf during the past year reveals a growing public acceptance of our services as well as an increasing awareness of all that yet remains to be done.

Counselling The major demand for service by the public continues to be in the areas of individual, marital, and family counselling. Our monthly caseload averages 35-40 with a probable total of 100 for the year. Our professional staff are involved in providing evaluation and treatment to:

- *Troubled and alienated marriage partners.
- *Persons who wish to understand their anxiety, doubt and feelings of failure, unhappiness and unfulfillment.
- *Persons who have unresolved difficulties in work or personal relationships.
- *Parents experiencing problems with their children.
- *Adolescents experiencing problems with family or society.
- *Engaged couples seeking premarital counselling.
- *Persons who wish to develop greater self-understanding and awareness, and to improve their decision-making and problem-solving abilities.
- *Unmarried parents making decisions and plans regarding the baby.

Adoption/Foster Home Services The year 1981 has seen a dramatic decrease in the number of single, pregnant women who have sought assistance from the Bureau. In 1980, 13 young single mothers received counselling with 7 mothers deciding to place their babies for adoption. This year only 4 mothers sought help with one infant being placed for adoption. As a result those couples waiting to adopt an infant can expect to wait for an indefinite period. Increasingly the trend for these young women has been to make plans and decisions without the benefits of professional counselling and, in many cases, they have decided to keep their infant children. Our concern for this situation has prompted us to explore other ways of reaching pregnant teenagers and young women to ensure that their individual decisions are well thought out.

Family Advocacy and Community Development The year 1981 has seen the Bureau continue to involve itself with many issues and projects all ultimately aimed at serving individuals and families and improving social conditions in the community. These include:

*A proposal to develop a clinic for single pregnant teenagers and young women which would offer access to services of professional counselling, financial assistance, nutritional teaching, residential care, prenatal education, parenting skills, and help with future plans.

*The joint establishment with the Catholic Family Services Bureau of a credit counselling service which has provided personal money management counselling and education for Islanders experiencing financial pressures. This service, which has been in operation for one year now, has been widely acclaimed across the Island and we are hoping that it will become an ongoing program of the Bureau.

*On-going support of the Transition House Association and its residential facility (Anderson House) for battered women and their children. During the year our staff have provided a leadership role in the Association through Board membership, training of staff, and provision of financial and clerical assistance.

*The Bureau is also part of a community-based group which has received federal funds to establish an Island-wide Community Volunteer Service. The aim of the service is to provide to each regional location a list of people willing to serve as volunteers as well as inventory of volunteer job descriptions from organizations requiring volunteers. To date the service has been established in Charlottetown and Summerside and we are now planning for O'Leary, Montague and Souris.

Board of Directors of the Protestant Family Service Bureau is made up of one representative from each of our supporting churches (13) as well as other representatives (8) of the community at large. The major committees include Executive, Finance, Public Relations, Church Relations, Family Life, and Program & Policy. Highlights of the work of these committees would include such things as: the development of radio and T.V. commercials for the Bureau which will be aired soon; research and planning on family life education which likely will culminate in a course(s) next year; and a major revision and updating of the Bureau's constitution which has remained unchanged since 1960.

Other activities during the year included participation in a 2-day Health Fair (Focus on Prevention & Mental Health) at Tower's Mall, numerous showings of the Bureau's slide presentation to various church and community groups, participation in the Charlottetown Christian Council, radio and newspaper interviews, and acting as a student placement agency for the Maritime School of Social Work's Bachelor of Social Work Program.

The Board of Directors and staff of the Bureau wish to thank each and every one of you for your continuing emotional encouragement and financial support and, as always, heartily welcome your concerns and suggestions.

LADIES AUXILIARY OF THE PROTESTANT FAMILY
SERVICE BUREAU ANNUAL REPORT 1981

The Ladies' Auxiliary continues its assistance to the needy in Charlottetown. The shop for economy clothing and furnishings operates Wednesdays and Fridays 1:30 - 3:00 p.m., 96 Fitzroy Street. The name of the shop is now registered. Articles sell from 25¢ to \$4.00. Unsold clothing is given to the Unitarian Services, Addiction Foundation, Hillsborough Hospital, Miminegash Outlet, Salvation Army or to those who have suffered misfortune. Some materials are made into quilts, others cut for rags, which are sold to industrial plants. The Guardian is a regular customer. Approximate income from the sale of rags was \$1,175.00 and from the shop \$3,928.92.

Dental bills totaling \$1,630.00 were paid for 15 children, born before 1965 to 18 years of age.

The Christmas Shop, free shopping for those in need, by appointment through the Bureau was held in St. Paul's Hall from December 14th to 19th. Many clients were recommended by Protestant Clergy. Gifts were provided for 750 children and 260 families and the Boat families. Donations for this shop amounted to \$3173.00. Many merchants in town, other business, private individuals and groups in schools, churches and clubs made excellent donations. Expenses were \$3,395.00.

The committee for home furnishings has assisted 51 families in distress.

Free wool for those who would like to knit for the 1982 Christmas Shop and material scraps for those who would like to sew quilts is supplied on request by the Auxiliary.

There is an on-going need for clothing, rags and all kinds of home furnishings for poverty victims.

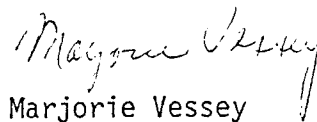
St. Peter's Cathedral is also well represented in the volunteer working force of Meals on Wheels by Elizabeth Armstrong.
