REPORT OF THE PRIEST INCUMBENT

A backward look over 1949 and what has been accomplished on the material side should help us to face 1950 with some optimism. The appalling expense entailed in putting the Fabric in order has been faced, and though much remains to be done yet the end begins to be in sight.

The campaign for increased revenue under the leadership of Col. G. K. Peake has produced satisfactory results. While it may be too soon to compute total gains, yet it has proved to be an effort well worthwhile making.

The Ladies' Guild has again had a most successful Annual Sale and our Funds have been substantially augmented by their generous contribution. The response to the "Cent-a-meal" scheme has been very gratifying and further organization should increase its value.

One outstanding improvement has been the cleaning of the pictures in the Chapel. This was made possible by the generosity of the heirs of the late Mrs. W. L. Cotton and by donations from the Simpson family Mr. J. E. Harris and Mrs. Orcutt, daughter of the late Basil King.

The painstaking work of the Organist and the services of the Choir are greatly appreciated.

While the Laymens' Association has not had many formal meetings yet a fine job of work was undertaken and completed by them at the Church Centre at Crapaud. It will help to preserve the building and add to its usefulness.

The A.Y.P.A. has met regularly and its members have worked happily together, willingly undertaking necessary and useful work for the Church, as well as making contributions to Church Funds.

The Wardens and Vestry have been most assiduous in carrying out their duties. Their kindly cooperation with the Incumbent is a happy feature of their meetings.

The Sunday School is still being carried on with regularity: the Teachers are faithful in their attendance and the Incumbent teaches a class of Senior boys in the morning and one of girls in the afternoon. The average attendance in 1949 was slightly better, but not what it should be and at the present time is not at all good. This is a matter for Parents. They must see that their children attend and do their lessons. Children that are absent cannot be taught.

During the past year His Grace the Primate was with us in Holy Week and Easter. He kindly took the service of preparation for Holy Communion on Maunday Thursday and preached at Evensong on Easter Day. His Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor was here for the D.C.S. and W.A. meetings in March, and in October administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to five candidates. Others who took part in services at St. Peter's were the Ven. Archdeacon Harrison, who preached at Evensong on the 20th. Sunday after Trinity; the Rev. S. J. Davies, who took duties for the Incumbent while he was at General Synod; the Rev. F. D. Smith who exchanged with the Incumbent when he preached at All Saints Cathedral; the Very Rev'd. Dean Brown of Huron and the Lord Bishop of Athabasca who preached here during General Synod; The Rev. W. T. Warren of

Morrisville, U.S.A., who did duty in July; the Rev. A. Piercey, who assisted at midnight on Christmas and the Rev. B. Fream. We are also indebted to the Rector of St. Paul's for many kindnesses.

In 1949 the Incumbent was away more than usual from the Parish not only for Diocesan Committees and Synod, but for the Provincial Synod in Montreal, in May and for the General Synod in September. It must be considered a privilege to serve on these various committees of Diocesan and General Synod, even though it means the absence of the Priest from the Parish.

On those who have entered the fold by Baptism and through Confirmation have become communicants we pray for God's blessing. For those who have departed this life we ask for peace, refreshment and light.

It is to be hoped that this year there will be increased attendance at Holy Communion, at the morning and evening services of worship and that those who can do work for Christ and His Church will gladly offer their services.

REPORT OF CHURCH WARDENS

The year just closed has been generally satisfactory for St. Peter's, and your Wardens feel they can express a note of optimism in this their annual report.

Church attendance, in the face of general slackness throughout the Christian world, has been most encouraging of late, while willingness to work, both among the men and women of the congregation, has been noticeable. Giving has been up to expectations, and probably better than it has ever been, as so it must continue if we are to finance both our capital debt and maintenance generally.

As our major problem has been the church fabric, we are glad to report that a careful examination of the entire premises by a competent contractor has revealed that the buildings are basically sound. He reports that we could not replace with as good today.

The church front, which we had been advised would have to be torn down and replaced, has been refaced with a new plastic coating. This work was done only after careful consideration of the physical and financial aspects of the problem. The cost, including repainting and replacing the brickwork where necessary, was done on contract for \$2,500, plus some extras for other repair work done. A new front would have cost between \$25,000 and \$50,000, depending on the type of construction used. In view of our present debt, and prospective income, your Vestry decided to try the new process, which is guaranteed to last five years, while the makers believe it will be good for twenty years. These periods are based on the assumption that the brickwork under the plastic coating will not shift. We can only pray that it will remain steady; if so, it would appear that the problem is solved until we have had an opportunity of improving our financial condition.

One side of the church has been reroofed with asphalt shingles, over a heavy asphalt roofing. Various minor repairs were found necessary while this work was in progress, and were attended to. Accounts for this work have not yet been received and will therefore be a charge against next year's income. It is believed the remaining side may be left until 1951.

It was hoped that it would have been possible to redecorate the interior of the church during the year, but due to delay in securing repairs to the roof, this could not be proceeded with. It is suggested that the main church porch be improved, and a tile floor laid this year, and that redecorating be left until the remainder of the roof is completed, in view of the cost of both re-roofing and redecorating.

Through the kindness of Mr. J. O. Hyndman the Sacristy was redecorated and the floor covered with linoleum during the year, without cost to the congregation.

From the financial standpoint the Wardens believe the year 1949 has been a successful one, and we are grateful to those members of the Vestry and congregation who have helped make the year one of progress. Particularly we would like to thank the Ladies Guild for the donation of \$1,000, and Lieut. Col. George Peake and his organization, whose successful campaign has already shown a substantial increase of envelope receipts.

The income from the Hodgson and Brecken Trusts shows an increase of over \$300.00, and we hope to increase the income from both these estates during 1950, by investing in good city mortgages and Government Bonds, from funds which have been carried in guaranteed investments, and Government deposits, at a lower rate of interest.

Our debt as at December 31, 1948 was \$15,600.00, but at that time we had a bank balance of \$898.56, which actually made our indebtedness \$14,702.00. The debt as at December 31, 1949 shows \$14,500.00 plus bank overdraft of 197.06, and we have spent \$2,916.66 on repairs and reconstruction, without including the reroofing referred to above. It would appear on the basis of this year's operations the church will be able to pay off its loan indebtedness once large capital expenditures are completed.

We cannot close this report without expressing appreciation to the Rector and again to the congregation, and trust they will give the incoming Vestry their wholehearted support.

I have the honour to submit the annual report of the Ladies Guild of St. Peter's Cathedral.

During the year—five (5) meetings were called by the President, Mrs. H. L. Pickard—three (3) of these taking place in the evening, so that members who could not attend otherwise were able to be present.

Average attendance 21. Seven (7) unofficial meetings were held during the usual Tuesday Afternoon Sewing, in order to bring before the members items of business that did not call for a general meeting.

The outstanding project for all concerned was the endeavour to raise as much money as possible for the debt on the Cathedral incurred by the necessary repairs to the fabrique.

At the Annual meeting held Feb. 1st \$1,000.00 was voted for the above purpose and at the last meeting of the year—Dec. 13—another sum of \$1,000.00 was given. This was made possible owing to the success of the Sale and Tea, Dec. 7th. A special effort was initiated by the President—for raising further sums—i.e. "Cent-a-Meal" collection. The scheme was unanimously approved by the members present and from February on the collections were faithfully handed in. In spite of the fact that the maximum number contributing was under thirty—the sum obtained totalled nearly \$300.00.

It was felt by all that this should be a congregational effort and Canon Malone from time to time emphasised this from the pulpit.

Plans are now in hand for reaching each member of the congregation and we hope the present year will bring greater success to this effort.

Ruffs for the choir boys and fresh collars for the lady choristers have been supplied by the Guild—making for greater uniformity of dress and dignity of appearance.

Other activities of the Guild for raising funds were as follows:—

- 4 Rummage Sale—Nov. 5.

In closing may I express the gratitude felt by the members of the Ladies Guild for your unfailing help and encouragement in their work.

CEMETERY REPORT

Congregation of St. Peter's Cathedral:

Request has been made that as Chairman of our Cemetery Committee I make a report to you for the year just closed.

First, you must understand it is not operated on a profit basis. Our sole efforts being directed to making it self-sustaining in order that there may not be any drain on the funds of the Cathedral. We have been, fortunately, able, up to the present, in doing this through extra contributions from year to year from friends and relatives of those buried there, plus income from our own endowments.

When change was made some few years ago from trustee to vestry government, we were then permitted to sell plots in advance of requirement, and if sufficient of our members would make their selection now and pay the required fee, we would indeed be self-supporting and could make such improvements as we contemplated in years past but which, of necessity, we have had to postpone due to lack of funds.

The graves are sold including perpetual care at \$35.00 per grave. In anticipating your needs now, you are assured that your last resting place and that of your loved ones will be of your own selection. The \$35.00 per grave is not excessive and should be within the reach of all. If necessary, we will grant time payments to those in need of such terms, but we would like to see more of our people in their lifetime take advantage of purchasing their own plots NOW.

The endowment fund is growing and will continue to grow as graves are sold. Control of the invested funds comes under the direction of the finance committee of our vestry and now totals \$5,250, the interest from which is far short of our cost of operation.

I will be pleased indeed to give full particulars to those contemplating plot purchase during 1950 and I earnestly hope a large number will do so.
