IN MEMORIAM

During 1959 death claimed the lives of three of the Trustees of St. Peter's Cathedral.

ERNEST A. FOSTER

On January 21st E. A. Foster passed away. From his boyhood he was a member of St. Peter's Cathedral Choir and for a great many years held the post of Precentor. Later, he was appointed a member of the Trustee Board, and, when it was dissolved, became a permanent member of the Vestry.

Mr. Foster was one of the leading druggists of this city, respected as a business man and interested in civic affairs. He was elected a City Councillor and eventually became Mayor of Charlottetown. For some years before his death he was in poor health and retired from active business.

To his widow, his three sons and his daughter we offer our sincere sympathy and pray that God will grant him eternal rest.

JOHN ORLEBAR HYNDMAN

Death came to J. O. Hyndman in the early morning of April 5th. He was a most faithful attendant of St. Peter's, a generous contributor to its funds, and a member of the Trustee Board for a great many years.

His charitable contributions to the Save the Children Fund were on a generous scale and his interest in the Navy League was well known.

Many in trouble and difficulties found in Mr. Hogg a helpful friend and by such he will be greatly missed. His outstanding work, however, was in connection with Sunday School by Radio, over which his voice was regularly heard, and its finances were also successfully handled by him.

REPORT OF THE RECTOR

In this peacful part of a generally troubled world, we of St. Peter's look back over another year in the history of this Cathedral Parish, and forward to the opportunites of 1960. We give thanks for blessings, and pray for guidance. We hear reports of the work accomplished by our officers and organizations; reports of money raised and money spent; reports of gifts and bequests and memorials; and, most important of all, reports of the sacred routine of prayer and praise and sacramental worship, the spiritual ministrations provided by our blessed Lord through His Church.

A parish meeting is a business meeting. But it is God's business that we are about. Therefore even the material aspects of 1959, matters of income and expenditure, are of vital concern in the Church's programme of worship and work. A floor renewed, a wall painted, a heating system brought up to date. These are not commonplace and ordinary matters. They are for the greater glory of God, the promotion of efficiency in His service. And beyond the boundaries of our own parish, the generous offerings of His people here will go to build churches, and parish halls, and university buildings in the Diocese at large, and, again, for the glory of God.

As your Rector I congratulate you on this more generous giving, and for all the other evidences of increased interest in the Church programme. And in the name of you all I thank the officers and members of all our parish organizations, from the Vestry to the Little Helpers, for the things they have accomplished during the year under review.

On your behalf, and for myself, I should like to say how much it has meant to us all to have Canon Malone actively associated with the life of the parish. His wise counsel and readiness to be of service have meant much to all at St.Peter's. Incidentally our sister parish of St. Paul's has even more reason to be grateful to this stalwart and distinguished priest who has helped them so often during their Rector's long illness and convalescence.

Report of the Rector - continued

St. Peter's has suffered a great loss in the death of the Reverend William Gregory Hogg and John Orlebar Hyndman. Both former trustees of the Cathedral, and active in its service to the last, this faithful priest and equally faithful layman will be greatly missed and their places will be hard indeed to fill. Another former trustee, the late Ernest Alfred Foster, was Precentor and loyal choir member until prevented by failing health from taking his full part in church activities.

The Church Wardens' report, and that of the Canvass Chairman, will show how successful has been the first year of our Combined Funds Canvass. Through it we have been enabled to take a significant part in the "Follow Me" Diocesan Church Extension Plan. It has also made possible the renovation of our heating system, and other improvements in fabric and property here at home.

The Cathedral has been visited during the year by the Bishops of this Diocese and by the Bishop of the Arctic; and by a number of priests, among whom the following took part in some of our services: The Very Reverend Cuthbert Simpson, The Reverend Canon Douglas Henderson, The Reverend William Warner and the Reverend Professor E. R. Fairweather.

We are very grateful to the Very Reverend E.B.N.Cochran, Dean of Nova Scotia, for the gift of a handsome green Altar frontlet formerly used in the Cathedral of All Saints, Halifax; and to Dr. Simpson, now Dean of Christ Church, Oxford a gift from whom made possible the replacement of a damaged cruet. Other gifts to the Cathedral include two cassocks and an alb, for the use of Servers, from the Senior Women's Guild.

May I close on a very personal note, expressing my thanks and appreciation for all your kindness and co-operation during the year past, and for such tangible evidence of your good-will and friendship as the generous offering at Christmas. I ask forgiveness of my many failures and shortcomings; and I also ask your prayers, that I may serve God and you His people more faithfully and effectively during the remainder of my incumbency.

THE VERY REVEREND CUTHBERT A. SIMPSON

During the year St. Peter's Cathedral was honoured by a son of its Rectory being appointed Dean of Christ Church, Oxford University. Dean Simpson is the eldest son of the late Rev. James Simpson, for many years Incumbent and Canon of this Cathedral.

Dean Simpson was educated at St. Peter's School, formerly connected with this Cathedral, and King's University at Windsor, Nova Scotia. He attended Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar; and, after serving in Parochial work in the Diocese of Nova Scotia for some years, he received an appointment to the staff of the General Theological Schinary, New York, where he served for some years until appointed Regius Professor of Biblical History at Oxford University. In 1959 he was appointed Dean of Christ Church, Oxford with jurisdiction over the College and Cathedral of that name.

The Rector and congregation of St. Peter's tender Dean Simpson their congratulations on his appointment, which has not only brought honour to himself, but to this Parish and his native Province. May his work be greatly blessed.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH WARDENS

The year 1959 was a busy one for your Vestry and Wardens. Faced with a Bank Overdraft of \$2962.05; unpaid accounts totalling \$1000.00; the honouring of our Pledge to the Diocese and the necessary installation of a new heating system as well as much maintenance and many repairs being required on the several buildings, we were a bit apprehensive as we took up the years work. Events have proven, however, that our fears were without foundation and we, at the close of the year, wish to express our sincere gratitude to the people of our Parish Family, who through their generous and conscientious giving make possible a review of the past years activities with the feeling that much has been accomplished to the Glory of God, in improvements made to our place of worship; in being able to play our part in the Diocese Church Extension Programme; in keeping up our standard of giving to various missionary and welfare organizations, and, at the same time solidify our financial standing to the extent that we are able to face the year ahead confident that St. Peter's will be able to cope with the many problems which ever confront a parish dedicated to the furthering of every aspect of Christ's work.

In connection with our Pledge to the Diocese, the Vestry decided that the "Long Tern" policy instituted by Diocese would entail the payment of a considerable amount of interest over the years, therefore, adhering to the original plan, which was to liquidate this commitment as soon as possible, \$5000.00 was forwarded to Halifax, leaving a balance of \$20,000.00.

Major repairs and improvements made during the year included the following:-

Installation of New Heating System: Many meetings were held in connection with this and expert advice obtained as to the type of furnace which would best suit our requirements and finally the contract was given to Douglass Bros. & Jones for their tendered amount of \$10,000.00, with the stipulation that they extend the system to take in the Sexton's quarters in exchange for any of the old pipe salvaged. The cost of installation was financed through a bank loan. The new boiler room has now been completed and the system on the whole seems to be giving satisfaction.

Cleaning of Chapel and Repairs to Sacristy: While many representations had been made to the Vestry to have a general clean up and

necessary repairs made to all buildings, it was decided that, due to our heavy commitments our efforts would be confined to Chapel and Sacristy which were badly in need of attention. The expenditure involved was a great deal larger than anticipated as it was found on examination that the floor of the Sacristy was in very bad condition. Some years ago floor covering had been laid over wall-to-wall carpeting, mould had set in and was beginning to rot the flooring, and a rather bad state of mustiness and dampness prevailed endangering the Vestments stored there. A new floor was laid consisting of tile on a plywood base which will stand up to a great many years traffic. It was also found that one section of the wall, behind a large cupboard, had never been finished and through the years the plaster had crumbled away. The painters were instructed to repair same, but here again, was an additional outlay of funds. We are of the opinion, however, that it was money well spent for our Sacristy now presents a much better appearance and with the exception of replacing the old sink, which is badly cracked and must certainly cause much inconvenience to the Sacristy Guild, no further work should be required for quite some time.

The cleaning of the Chapel was accomplished by a working party, consisting of the Rector, members of the Vestry and several other volunteers.

Rochford Square Dwelling: Much needed repairs and maintenance were taken care of during the year including improvements to the heating system.

Rectory: A new fence was errected on the Rectory grounds which tends to give a certain degree of privacy to the Rectory yard.

Looking forward to the year ahead, our policy must necessarily be one of economy. Our Pledge to the Diocese and the liquidating of as much as possible of the Bank loan will be our major concern; but we also purpose to incorporate in our budget a donation to the Protestant Family Welfare Bureau. This worthwhile organization is doing splendid work although handicapped by having insufficient funds. Their records indicate the requirement of a minimum assured income of \$8000.00 of which \$3000.00 is received from the City and Province. They have asked the City Churches to underwrite the balance of \$5000.00, and there is every indication that most parishes in the City are accepting this responsibility, and your Vestry feel that St.Peter's should, and could, make a

suitable contribution over and above the amount realized from the Indigent Fund but in line of course with the size of our congregation.

It is realized that many more improvements to our Parish buildings are required. Complaints have been made regarding the lighting system of the Cathedral and the state of the floor covering; but your Vestry is of the opinion, that for the present at least, we should commit ourselves only to expenditures that are absolutely necessary until our indebtedness is considerably reduced.

In closing may we again express our thanks to all for the support and co-operation we have received during the past year.
