# Annual Report of St. Peter's Cathedral

#### FOR THE YEAR 1940

#### REPORT OF THE PRIEST INCUMBENT

During 1940 the war has taken such a toll in the destruction of civilian life and property, that we are appalled at the prospect of restoration which will be ours when victory has been won. It means that we shall have to face sacrifices now and still greater ones later on.

Whatever happens there can be no blackout of the Cross. The work of the Church must go on and its Missions must be given our fullest support.

At St. Peter's we are beginning to feel the pinch. Several families have left us and numbers of our young men are serving in the Forces of their country.

Those who remain should be ready to undertake extra work for the glory of God and the good of His Church.

Our statistics tell the tale in a small decrease in nearly all the figures, which may be studied at the end of this Report.

The outstanding event in the life of the Church in this Province was the celebration of the Centenary of the Diocesan Church Society, at which we welcomed not only our own Archbishop, but the Primate of all Canada.

There have been cheering signs, in the past year, of reviving life and better fellowship and the hope that the Church here will be able to make a more united effort to carry on its work.

These have been shown (a) in the holding of Retreats, (b) in Missions held in the Rural Parishes (c) in the effort made to provide a course of Sermons in each parish by means of a general exchange of pulpits (d) in the renewed attempt to hold Deanery Meetings.

In all this we feel that St. Peter's has benefitted. It was a great advantage to us to have as special preachers, Rev'ds J. T. Payne, A. LeD. Gardner, S. J. Davies and Ven. G. R. Harrison.

We feel also that the exchange of pulpits during Lent between the Rector of St. Paul's and the Incumbent of St. Peter's has been a help to both congregations.

Another sign of united effort was the Confirmation held at St. Peter's at which candidates were also presented from the Parishes of St. Paul's, Summerside, Port Hill and Crapaud.

We were glad to welcome to our midst the new Rectors of St. Paul's and Port Hill and send our good wishes to Rev. A. H. and Mrs. Hart-Davies praying that in his new sphere of work at St. Thomas's Church, Edinburgh, they will both find happiness.

Among those who have assisted at Services at St. Peter's, to whom we are most grateful, were Rev. T. H. Hunt, D. D., who supplied for the Incumbent in the summer. Rev. W. J. Phillips and G. S. Tanton, who have come to our aid in times of need, Rev. P. R. Beatty of the Student Christian Movement, who preached at the D. C. S. Service, Revds Dr. Simpson, G. R. Hartman, and B. Fream. We also thank Mr. Burleigh Taylor for his kind help from time to time.

It was a great pleasure to have with us Mr. Walter MacNutt who was kind enough to preside at the organ on the Sunday of his visit here.

The Incumbent has been absent on several occasions in other Parishes Viz: Georgetown, Cherry Valley, Alberton, O'Leary, Port Hill, Milton and Rustico, and St. Albans, Woodside, N. S.

He has also taken a Retreat for clergy at Liverpool, N. S. and a mission at Sussex, N. B. It was his privilege to preach at the closing services of King's Collegiate and Edgehill Girls Schools at Windsor, N. S.

We again congratulate the Women's Guild on the success of their Sale and Tea and thank them for their generous donations to our work.

The Sunday School still plays an important part in the life of the Church and our young teachers deserve our active support.

The necessity will soon arise of providing the new Hymn Book for the use of the Choir and Congregation. At one Church this was done by each family providing as gifts to the Church, two or more books. Some such method could be adopted without causing a great deal of expense to anyone

The Daily Services are not used by the young people as they should be. Again I appeal for your cooperation. Let each family be represented each week and so help in the all-important work of intercession which is being done each day.

The attendance at Evensong is also getting smaller and smaller. Surely people can leave their firesides and radios for one hour to worship God and join in prayer for the success of the cause which means so much to the Empire and to the world.

Death has taken from us: Minnie Campbell, who never forgot the apostolic precept "to do good and to distribute". Many were the sacrifices she made to give to others and her deeds of

kindness and generosity will be long remembered. Constance Williams, who in late years suffered much and is deeply mourned by a family, whose welfare she made her first consideration and who will always hold her in affectionate remembrance.

May they rest in peace.

May God grant us all His Blessings and may our work for Him prosper in this year that has begun.

#### REPORT OF CHURCH WARDENS

At the close of another year the Wardens which you elected to office beg to present their report, which we trust you will, along with the Incumbent's report and Financial statements study with care, thoughtfulness and a determination to strengthen for the future the weak points, with at the same time a feeling of thankfulness for the blessings which are ours as a congregation.

The report of the Treasurer shows that the total debt of the Cathedral is \$2.517.43. It

should be remembered however, that the Campaign Fund is responsible for \$700.00 of this debt, which stood at \$1100.00 a year ago and was reduced by payments received by the Wardens from

the Campaign Committee. The deficit for the year was \$219.83

We believe that all bills for the year under review have been paid. But, the bill for coal now being used, remains, as usual unpaid. We wish that it were possible to pay for the coal in

The new well for some unknown reason gave some little trouble last spring, and during May the Trask Well Company bored it seventeen feet deeper (well is now 135 feet deep) without expense to the congregation, and during a test made in the fall it proved to be entirely satisfactory. Taking off the water in the cellar is necessary, but it would be more satisfactory if it were kept out. With this end in view your Wardens excavated outside the east wall from front to entrance of the cellar and filled in putty clay. This effort met with much success, as during all the heavy autumn and winter rain falls, only a very small quantity of water seeped in. We believe that if a similar treatment is extended fifteen or twenty feet further north that the trouble from water will be fully treatment is extended fifteen or twenty feet further north that the trouble from water will be fully overcome. We recommend that this be done, as the expense would be small.

During the year repairs were kept at a minimum, but new roofing was put on the day school and kitchen of the Cathedral Hall. The south side of the Hall was given one coat of paint, but should receive another coat next summer, as should the whole Hall. The trim of the Rectory was also painted, and some repairs made to its water spouts. A new cement hatch was placed in the Cathedral for the putting in of coal, and other small and necessary repairs were made.

Early in the year an appeal was made for more contributions for the Cathedral Magazine. Some improvement followed, but only \$39.00was received, which is not nearly sufficient to pay for the publication. We again ask for increased support for the magazine if its continuance

is desired.

Mr. Joseph Duncan who had been our efficient Sexton for two years resigned as from 31st May, to follow his chosen work. On first of June, Mr. Percy Carr was appointed to take over the duties of Sexton and both he and Mrs. Carr have since performed their duties to our entire satisfaction, and we believe to the congregation as a whole.

The sum of \$1075.00 was received from the Hodgson Trust during the year, being a re-

duction of \$225.00 from 1939.

The Ladies' Guild have as usual been most active in many ways, not only for their grant of \$500.00 for Church funds, but for their keen interest in the welfare of the Cathedral, the thanks of the congregation are truly their due.

At the request of the Chairman of the Cemetery Committee the sum of \$98.75 was paid from Cemetery Funds for the purchase of a \$100.00 War Bond, for the Cemetery Investment ac-

About two years ago Rev. Canon Malone handed over to the Wardens a little over \$160.00 which had come into his hands from several sources for care of the Vestments of the Clergy. This was placed by the Wardens in a Savings Account in the Canadian Bank of Commerce. During the year the Wardens with a part of this money purchased a One Hundred Dollar Dominion of Canada second war loan Bond, No. K. I. A. 105372 due in 1952, (\$99.25 and accrued interest of 66 cents) and placed it for safe keeping in the hands of the Secretary of the Trustees, the interest on same to be used for the purpose for which it was intended. This leaves a balance of \$68.46 in Savings Account C. 976, Canadian Bank of Commerce. It is hoped that during 1941 this amount

will be increased sufficiently to allow the purchase of another Bond.

At the close of the Books on 31st December the sum of \$104.75 was owing the Cathedral from Envelope holders. Of this amount, \$3.00 has since been received. It is hoped that others may also pay up the amounts they pledged. If all would but only contribute regularily each week or month, it would be a great help to the financing of the Cathedral, and at the same time make much easier the work of those you ask to undertake duty as your officials. These officials should

not be expected to give of their time in making calls to collect the amounts pledged.

As we have advised you during the year in the Cathedral Monthly. the Income of the Cathdral is not sufficient to meet its necessary and regular expenses. Two courses are rightly open. Either an increase of revenue or a cutting down of expenditure. The course to be followed must eventually be settled by the congregation.

If it were not for the financial help of the Ladies Guild, the situation would not be good.

We consider that the Cathedral should and could be in such a financial condition, that any donation given by the Ladies Guild, could then be put aside for any special purpose the congregation might decide upon. In short, it would be well if these donations had not to be used to help pay for running expenses.

As you are aware the Church in Canada has recently accepted a new responsibility to raise its own Missionary money, and so release the Church in the Mother Country of its contribution to the work of the Canadian Church. With this end in view, we shall have to try and meet our

Missionary Apportionment in the years which lie before us.

During the year your Wardens have had regular meetings, and each Sunday after Evensong at least two of them spend an hour or more checking off and accounting for the collections. We have to the best of our ability, so far as time permits, tried to serve you faithfully and to place before you a frank Report worthy of your consideration.

We wish to place on record our appreciation of the untiring and faithful work of the En-

velope Clerk, Miss Fairclough.

We wish to thank the members of the congregation for much loyal support, and trust that

our efforts will meet with their approval.

St. Peter's has for over seventy years stood for what she believed to be the doctrines and practices of the Holy Catholic Church, and as its members see these things more and more exemplified throughout not only the Diocese but throughout the Dominion, it must give to all not

only faith but a feeling of thankfulness for the work carried on at St. Peter's during so many years.

While many of our sons are on Active Service, in defence of Democracy and Christianity, it is our duty to carry on.

Let us at the home base not be found weary or slacking in the work

of Christ and His Church.
