# Annual Report of St. Peter's Cathedral

### FOR THE YEAR 1938

#### REPORT OF THE PRIEST INCUMBENT

In the year 1938 St. Peter's has had its share of trouble. For a small congregation the sudden loss of a new furnace is a serious catastrophe, yet it is in times of trouble that the stuff, of which members of a Church are made, is shown. Without a murmur, and in a very short space of time the loss was made good. Such incidents are occasions for heartfelt gratitude and provide a powerful antidote to any temptation to des-

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese and all the clergy of the Island have visited St. Peter's and taken part in our services during the past year. We have also had visits from the Rev. Philip R. Beattie of the Student Christian Movement, the Rev. V. C. Spencer, Missionary in Japan, Rev. A. G. Bradshaw, Rector of Maitland, and Rev. T. H. Hunt, D.D., who kindly did duty for the Incumbent in the Summer. We are very grateful to them and to Mr. A. P. C. Rees who has given valuable assistance in the Services of the Church.

The Ladies Sale has again proved that hard work brings success. We offer our congratulations and express our gratitude to them for the financial aid given to

the Furnace Fund and the Annual Income of the Church.

During the year a change in personnel has occurred and Mr. Joseph Duncan

has been appointed Sexton. We hope that he will be happy in his work.

We are most grateful to those men of the congregation who have given time and labour in connection with the Campaign and Furnace Funds; to the Committee, who, with the assistance of the Ladies, ran the Sunday School Picnic and to those who undertook the Christmas Decorations.

We would offer our sincere sympathy to Mr. H. S. Stewart who, on account of his own illness and that of Mrs. Stewart, has been unable to give the same attention

to the duties of Churchwarden, which he had been accustomed to give, and pray that both he and Mrs. Stewart will be helped and comforted.

We take this opportunity of thanking Mr. W. G. Hogg, our other Warden, for stepping into the breach at a time of crisis and for handling affairs most efficiently, giv-

ing much time and labour to clearing up a difficult situation.

Mrs. Reay, our organist, has given valuable assistance to the boys of the choir

and a marked improvement in their singing is the result.

The work of the Sunday School is being carried on very satisfactorily by young teachers who are keen on their work and faithful in its performance. One great need, however, is a Bil-le Class for those over Sunday School age and we hope the men will come to our aid.

Among those whom we have lost by death special mention must be made of Helen Mitchell, a lady of culture and deep Christian conviction, who belonged to a family of prominence in this Province; of Jessie Henrietta Harris, a devout member of this Church whose saintly life was a wonderful exemplification of the ness of goodness," Jessie Simpson, a faithful and earnest supporter of St. Peter's to whom sincerity in word and deed was the first rule of life: of Annie Michael, a pious and faithful Orthodox Christian, who during her long residence in this city was sincerely attached to this congregation. May they rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon them! We, who remain, must endeavour that their example of life and work

may be perpetuated and that the Church may not be spiritually poorer by their loss.

From the point of view of numbers St. Peter's Cathedral certainly appears to hold its own. There is, however, one fact to which attention should be called: while the number of communicants at Christmas and Easter is larger than in former years, yet the total number of communions made in the year is smaller. Does this indicate that the younger members of the Church are not as regular at the daily service and their monthly communions as they should be? Does it mean that as death takes our older members from us, their successors are not filling their places as

. Church may be strong financially and numerically and yet be spiritually poor.

Let us pray God that we may escape that fate.

#### REPORT OF THE CHURCHWARDENS

As you have already been advised of the destruction of the 1937 boiler, we will not go into details here, suffice it to say the 1938 boiler is installed and giving good satisfaction, and we earnestly hope will continue doing so for some years to come; let

us hope we have not entered an annual model purchase plan.

We would like to draw your attention to one or two things in the annual report of the Treasurer—the total received on account of Envelopes, \$2226.53, is a decrease of \$150.07 compared with 1937. Loose collections also show a decrease of \$118.91—being \$292.67, compared with \$411.58 in 1937. The Hodgson bequest paid in \$100.00 more than the previous year. On the basis of these three items we have a decrease in revenue

The Cemetery Account shows a loss in the year's work of \$46.23. This department should be self supporting, and if those obligated would contribute as they should the cemetery would not be a liability on the Cathedral.

The Cathedral Monthly also accounts for a shortage in accounts of \$54.11

which is a slight improvement over the previous year.

The total liabilities are shown as \$2215.44, of this \$1600.00 is due the Bank of Montreal, but is offset by pledges due the Campaign Fund for a like amount. Included in the balance \$615.44 is two items or balances due the Chapel Fund of \$171.51. and Baptistry \$6.00 a total of \$189.51; if these two items were consolidated in the general fund, our liabilities would be reduced by just that amount, and as the repairs, etc. are fund, our habitities would be reduced by just that amount, and as the repair, etc. are paid from Cathedral Funds, we would recommend that this be done, as there is no question but the money has been expended in the past. If this were done it would leave the debt as at December 31st, last, aside from the amount due the Bank, \$425.93 which may be accounted for by the shortage in the revenue \$168.98, defect in Cemetery and Cathedral Monthly \$100.34, a total of \$269.32, leaving a balance of \$156.61 increase in debt not accounted for.

We would like to draw to your attention the necessity of repairs to the floor of the School Room, Previous to the annual sale, temporary repairs were made, but the condition of the rafters supports ,etc, is such we can not recommend its remaining so any longer, it is positively unsafe for any large gathering, and should be our next

We would suggest to the Men's Club that they debate the question of receipts from envelopes, and endeavour to find a remedy, as it is evident from year to year we must expect a decrease from this source; if they would appoint two of their number to assist in the collection of contributions for the Cemetery Fund, the necessary information would be given them to assist in the same. In a like manner the responsibility of the Cathedral Monthly finances, could be taken off the shoulders of Canon Malone.
