THE RECTOR'S REPORT

The Wardens, Vestry and Parishioners of the Cathedral of Saint Peter, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island

GREETINGS: -

I would like to touch upon some of the high lights of the past year, the visit of the Most Reverend Howard H. Clark, Primate of Canada and Mrs Clark, was an outstanding event in the life of the Church on the Island. It was the Primate's first visit. The Parishioners of St. Paul's provided a reception to afford the Members of the Primate's Visit Committee and the Executive of the Diocesan Church Society opportunity to meet the Primate and Mrs. Clark. The Lieutenant Governor graciously received the Primate at Government House. The Services at Summerside and at Confederation Centre in Charlottetown were outstanding. We were blessed by the Primate's presence at the early Eucharist at Saint Peter's. We trust that this will be but the first of many visits to the Island by Archbishop and Mrs. Clark.

Another first, since he was appointed Governor General, was the visit of their Excellencies, The Right Honourable and Mrs. Roland Michener, to the Island and to Saint Peter's Cathedral. The Governor General, a devoted Churchman, read the lesson at the Choral Eucharist. Their Excellencies' deep devotion and participation in the service were an inspiration to all and expecially to the young people.

On Sunday, June 30th, within the Octave of the Feast of Saint Peter, Canon E. M. Malone, M.A., D.D., D.C.L., Honourary Priest Assistant, Priest Incumbent of Saint Peter's Cathedral 1921-1952, in the sixty-second year of his priesthood, blessed and planted a tree, assisted by Dr. H.H. Kelly and Mr. Donald Carruthers, Cathedral Wardens, to mark the 99th Anniversary of the building of Saint Peter's Cathedral. All were thrilled to note the vigour in his voice as he lead us in the prayers he loves so well.

Dr. H. L. Palmer, Vice-Chancellor of the Diocese of Nova Scotia, a devoted parishioner of Saint Peter's and a wise councillor in Church matters in both Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, was appointed by the Bishop of Nova Scotia to be Chancellor of the Diocese. In his Charge to Synod the Bishop said of Judge Palmer, "(he) has proved himself a dedicated Churchman from St. Peter's Cathedral Parish in Charlottetown, whose worth won further recognition a few years ago when he was elected Prolocutor of our Provincial Synod (comprising the Dioceses of Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Fredericton, Quebec and Montreal)....

Our Church in Prince Edward Island has a long association with the Diocese of Nova Scotia, and your Bishops are proud that a son of Prince Edward Island should for the first time in Diocesan history hold the high post of Chancellor." AMEN. So say we all.

Miss Dianne Kays, a member of the Choir and a student at St. Dünstan's University, was selected as the first Youth Delegate to the Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia. She is the first young person to be so honoured. We trust that more of the youth of our Diocese will be elected to our Diocesan Synod but can see this happen only when the Synod is held over a weekend rather than a middle-of-the-week affair.

Our Sunday School and attendance at the Parish Eucharist continue to grow. We are most grateful to Mr. Arthur Holland, Superintendent, and his faithful band of Teachers. The Lenten Church School on Saturday mornings was an outstanding "success". We look forward next year to continued growth. Persons who are interested in helping with the school should contact Mr. Holland. A group for young people grades eight and up has been started. This group meets on Sunday evenings at 5:30 P.M. The programme is a talk, film, debate or guest speakers, supper and closes with Evensong.

Saint Paul's and St. Peter's were hosts to a Deanery Boys' Conference on Vocation. The theme was "WHAT'S A LIFETIME FOR?". We are grateful to the Parishioners who provided hospitality and the ladies who provided meals and snacks. We are looking forward to next year's conference for Girls.

Saint Peter's Young People were well represented at the Youth Camps held at the Deanery Centre at Crapaud. We hope that more may attend next year and that the people of Saint Peter's will renew their interest and support of the Centre. It can become a great unifying instrument in the life of the Church on the Island.

The "Mothers of Young Children" under the leadership of Mrs. Rosemary Hill held their first meeting in November when our own Mrs. Isabel Harling was the speaker. We believe that this group will provide a forum for discussion of Church, home and family concerns and an opportunity for fellowship, inspiration and deepening the spiritual life of our parish. We urge our women to participate in the interesting programme which has been planned for the New Year.

ONE HUNDREDETH ANNIVERSARY

In 1969 we will observe the 100th Anniversary of the building of the then Saint Peter's CHURCH, later to be designated a CATHEDRAL by Bishop Binney. Due to the Rector's illness the observation will take place in the Fall. Full particulars will be in your hands by May.

On November 17th 1968, following a delicious Pot-Luck Supper, provided by the Ladies of the Parish, the Parishioners decided to provide Sunday School and Meeting rooms in the basement of the Cathedral and to leave the building of a new parish hall to a later date. These rooms will provide long needed facilities and will prove most useful to our Parish Education Programme. Two ad hoc committies have been set up; Building Committee and Finance Committee (Ways and Means). These Committies will be made up of the respective committees of the Vestry together with other knowledgable people from the congregation. You will be hearing more about this project in the report of the Building Committee.

We are grateful to all who have assisted with the Church's round of "Fast and Festival", especially to Canon Mark Ferguson, to our Wardens and Vestrymen, the Director and Members of the Choirs, our competent Organist, our Lay Readers, the members of our Servers' Guild and last but by no means least to our industrious Sexton, Mr. William Ling. Many have said that Saint Peter's has the best kept lawns and sidewalks, especially in Winter, of any property in Charlottetown.

To the Leaders and Members of our various parish organizations we are most appreciative of their good works. We extend a special word of congratulations to these who made such a success of "Grandma's Atticand Annual Supper and Bazzar.

I would like to close this report with a very personal note from my wife and myself. How can we thank you for all the kindness that has been shown to us during and since my hospitalization early in December. I have said that if a person must be sick, be sick on P.E.Island and preferably at Saint Peter's Cathedral. We shall be eternally grateful for all the love and kindness God has shown us through you.

Property Warden's Report

Following the last annual meeting the Vestry appointed various committees, one of these was the property committee. Committees such as we have had during the last year are a very useful way of dividing up work, and getting work accomplished.

The early additions to our property were tables for the Sunday School class. The first part of the year, only necessary maintenance was carried out, but as the year went on, the gutters of the Church were repaired and the brick work pointed in the areas where it had deteriorated. Aluminum windows were put on the Rectory and all glass in the Cathedral, Rectory and Hall repaired. The hot water system for the kitchen sink was repaired but this was unsatisfactory. Further arrangements to supply hot water for the ladies at the time of our annual tea is necessary.

Immediatel following our Special Congregation meeting in the fall, the property committee was expanded to a building committee of 16 souls.

The terms of reference for this committee were to prepare plans for Sunday School rooms in the basement of the Church with all the necessary specifications and contractors asked to tender on the plans. The committees worked very hard and conscientiously and have prepared very desirable plans. These plans have been posted in the Church entry for two weeks. On January 17 we opened the tenders, and the firm of William Murphy and McLeod had the low tender of \$36,859.00 on general construction; Bevan Bros \$7269.00 on mechanical and Palmer Electric Ltd., \$2,595.00 was the low on electrical.

The Building Committee recommended to the Vestry that these low bids be accepted. The Vestry held back the signing of the actual contracts until this annual meeting and the congregation are informed, but in the meantime are allowing excavation, so that any water problems and any other basement problems, which may be encountered will be observed before this meeting. The total cost including Architects fees as the plans were recieved by the contractors is \$49,050.00. The building committee and the Vestry recommend that these be accepted. In addition two posts in a large roomcan be engineered out of this area by an additional cost of \$383.00, this is also recommended.

As Property Warden and Chairman of the Building Committee I want to express my sincere appreciation and thanks to the building committee and everyone who helped in this endeavour.

Financial Wardens Report - 1968

I submit a statement of the churchs receipts and expenditures for 1968 as prepared by H. R. Doane & Company C.A. together a budget for 1969 prepared by the Wardens. Both are self explanatory but I should like to comment on a few items. The most significant is the increase of more than \$2,000 in givings and although stipends and Honoria increased \$1,457 the total parish operating expenses increased only \$892. Last year we budgeted for a \$2,000 debt reduction but to do so it appeared our income would be \$2,801 short and I am pleased to draw to your attention that our debt was reduced \$2,500 and we ended the year with a surplus of \$1,111.

This year we are budgeting \$6,100 to reduce our borrowings and pay the interest on loans of \$44,000. This can be done if we increase our givings 20/25 per cent.

We have negotiated a new contract for furnace oil which will mean a savings of approximately \$400 in 1969.

We have been advised by the Canada Permanent Trust Company that the fees for handling the securities of our various trusts will increase. The increase will amount to approximately \$350 and we have therefore arranged for the securities to be transferred to Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce where the charge will be \$85 less than paid in 1968.

A committee has been formed with the object of finding ways and means to raise funds to finance the cost of the proposed new Sunday School classrooms in the basement of the church. The committee has not met since it was organized as it was only last week the cost of the renovations was known.

You will be hearing from us.

We must again urge parents to encourage their children to attend regularily, bearing in mind that one of the advantages of the family Eucharist is the convenience of one trip to the Cathedral for both church attendance and Sunday School.

Meetings of the teachers were held monthly for instruction and discussion.

A successful picnic was held at Lord Selkirk Park in June.

Transportation to Summerside was provided by the Vestry for all children (6 yrs) to attend the Youth Raily on the occasion of the Primate's Visit.

A Christmas 'Birthday Party' was held in the Parish Hall on December 27 with approximately 40 Children attending.
