### REPORT OF THE PRIEST INCUMBENT

The year 1944 has been a most important one for us, because St. Peter's has completed the 75th year of its existence. We celebrated the occasion with very fine anniversary services on the Eve and on the Feast of St. Peter. It was a great privilege to have our new Bishop, the Right Rev'd. G. F. Kingston, assisting at our celebration and it was a pleasure to give him a welcome to this Province. Most of the clergy of the Island were at our anniversary services, and we were very glad to have also two sons of St. Peter's, the Rev. C. R. Harris, Rector of Parrsboro, N. S., and the Rev. Dr. C. A. Simpson of the General Theological Seminary, New York. Other visiting clergymen were Rev. Canon Ellis of All Saints Cathedral, Halifax, and Rev. T. V. L'Estrange, Chaplain R.C.A.F.

We were fortunate during the year to have had all of the clergy of the Island at our D. C. S. service at St. Peter's and also Rev. Douglas Smith, R.C.A.F.

It was a pleasure too to welcome as preachers Rev. H. W. Guinness, R.A.F., Rev. F. W. Weaver of the Seamen's Mission, Rev. Colonel Cox, District Chaplain, C.A., Rev. Dr. Simpson who preached at the Anniversary Celebration, and Rev. S. J. Davies who also assisted at the Midnight Mass of Christmas.

In connection with the 75th anniversary a very inspiring Mission was held by Rev. Father Palmer, who was assisted by Brother James, S.S.J.E. The weather during the Mission could not have been much worse, but the attendance throughout was most encouraging. We pray that God may bless this Mission to our souls and to the souls of many others.

The annual Sale of Work has again been a great success. We hope that this congregational effort will not be allowed to languish, for, in spite of all the labour required, it is a wonderful means of bringing all the members of the Church together to work. The Women's Guild is to be congratulated on its achievement.

The A. Y. P. A. has functioned regularly and has been quite active and is doing a good work for the young people. Unfortunately we have no young men as members as yet.

The work of the Choir and its Instructor is to be commended. The services have been rendered with great reverence and dignity.

The Sunday School, with its staff of very young teachers is still doing a valuable work and the Boys' Bible Class, though small, provides a useful means of instruction in the Sacred Scriptures. We would like to see its usefulness greatly increased.

Several devoted members of St. Peter's have gone to their reward in 1944. We mention specially Mrs. William Meek who was a regular worshipper and devoted worker; Mr. L. E. Brecken, Chairman of the Trustees and a life-long member of this Church, who has proved his loyalty by a very substantial Legacy to the Church he loved; Mrs. W. L. Cotton, a faithful member of St. Peter's from the time of its foundation who died in her 94th year and set before us all a noble example of a life lived with righteousness.

as its guiding star; the Rev. Christopher Easton, who for some years had retired from active service but was most faithful in his attendance at the services of the Church; and one, who was formerly a Choir-boy and Server at the Altar, Douglas Orford, who gave his life in the service of his country.

For these and all others who have died in the past year we pray for rest, refreshment and light in Paradise.

We have done what we could to welcome men from the Forces to our services and to extend to them such hospitality as was possible.

We commend to your support the Cemetery Fund and the Cathedral Monthly, now in its twenty-second year of issue.

Statistics have been appended to this Report. They give us no cause for self-satisfaction. It is becoming more and more difficult to impress on our people in these days the duty of Sunday worship, the value of frequent communion, the blessing of the daily Eucharist, and the fitness of attending Evensong to complete the worship of the Lord's Day.

Our hope and prayer is that in 1945 there will be a better attendance at the daily Eucharist, that the large numbers, who make their communions at Christmas and Easter, especially the men of the Congregation, will practice the rule of monthly Communion, and that there will be a general spiritual advance.

St. Peter's has great traditions of worship to maintain. It has been most abundantly blessed in the past, but great privileges entail great responsibilities. To whomsoever much has been given, from them shall much be required.

## REPORT OF CHURCH WARDENS

Your Wardens at the close of another year present their Report together with Financial Statements, which they trust will be printed before the annual meeting, so as to give the members of the congregation an opportunity to study them before attending the meeting.

As will be seen the contributions to the Church both in envelopes and loose collection are lower than in 1943. This is caused in part by death, but also we regret to say by some not contributing the amount they pledged.

The missionary apportionment of \$740.00 has been exceeded by \$40.83 and in addition the amount of \$52.00 for a special advance movement has been met and remitted to the Diocesan Office, Halifax.

It may be noted here there are some very liberal contributors to both Church and Missions, but on the other hand it is felt that many might well increase their contributions.

Early in the year an appeal was made to the congregation to wipe out the balance of the note for \$1,112.25 due at the Bank, but only \$672.25 was received for this purpose. To this amount was added \$40.00 from Church income, thus reducing the note to \$400.00. This small obligation should be wiped out at an early date.

During the year the sum of \$1,578.58 was received from the Hodgson Trust Estate.

At the request of the chairman of the cemetery committee a \$100.00 Seventh Victory Loan Bond was purchased and placed with the Eastern Trust Company, as were also the following Bonds for cemetery, \$200.00 Estate H. S. Stewart; \$100.00 Mrs. Margaret J. and Rosa Mitchell, \$200.00 Mrs. James Simpson, and also \$100.00 from Mrs. James Simpson for the Church.

Since the accounts were closed as at 31st December, there has been received on account of 1944 in envelopes,— For Church \$14.40; for Missions 60 cents.

Owing to the shortage of labour it was very difficult to have some necessary repairs made to the Church property. However the north side of the roof of Parish Hall was covered with patent shingles and a few minor repairs made. A radiator in the Rectory was moved. As instructed at the last annual meeting the matter of heating the Chapel was looked into and after consideration a pipeless furnace was installed, which it is hoped will prove satisfactory. It was found that the chimney of the chapel was plugged up and this necessitated considerable labour by a stone mason. This work has been paid for, except a small balance of the work done at close of year. The installation of this furnace will cost over \$200.00.

Late in the fall some of the coping stones on the Chapel gave way and were temporarily attended to. Permanent repairs will have to be made in the spring. The wire netting on many of the memorial windows have rusted beyond repair and must be replaced after the frames are painted. The gutter on the west side of the Church is in very bad condition and must be replaced. The Church roof also badly needs repairing.

We regret that Miss Fairclough who for so many years was the efficient and faithful envelope clerk has been obliged to relinquish her work, but we trust she will soon be restored to health.

Mr. and Mrs. Carr have as usual performed their duties in their interested and careful manner, and they can feel assured, we believe, of the thanks of the whole congregation.

During the year several members of the congregation passed away. We mention here only two. Mr. Leith E. Brecken, B.A., for some years a Warden and a Trustee until

his death which took place on 1st November. On the 12th December Mrs. W. L. Cotton also passed away — she being at her death the oldest member of the congregation. Both during their long lives were devoted to St. Peter's, and both we understand have left bequests to assure the work and adornment of the church they loved.

May we urge that during the year which is now opening upon us a marked improvement in the attendance at the services of the Church be undertaken by the members of the congregation.

To members of the congregation who have suffered bereavement at home or overseas we extend our sincere sympathy, and trust that 1945 will bring us victory, and an enduring peace.
