## I N M E M O R I A M

Among the members of the congregation who have been taken from us by death we would mention Geoffrey David FitzGerald, Flora Hope (Wiggins), his wife, and Laura A. Young.

Geoff FitzGerald came of a clerical family, for his father Judge FitzGerald was the son of the Rev'd Dr. FitzGerald, who was Rector of St. Paul's when St. Peter's Cathedral was founded. He was liked by all for his love of sport and games, for his youthful manners and friendly disposition. He served his country in both wars and was interested in boys' work and the meetings of the Laymen's Association.

His wife, Flora Hope Wiggins also came of a clerical family, for her grandfather was Rector of St. Eleanor's, P.E.I. and her uncle served for many years as Rector of the Parish of Sackville, N.B. She too shared her husband's love of sport, but was also a keen business woman in the field of Radio advertising and broadcasting. Until prevented by ill health she was an indefatigable worker at St. Peter's Annual Sale.

Laura A. Young, originally an Islander came back to live in Charlottetown after retirement from an important position in the Library of McGill University. She will ever be remembered for her gentle character, her cultured manners, her love of good books, her own personal devotional life and her interest in every department of the Church's life and work. Not only was she a regular attendant and communicant of St. Peter's, but a most generous contributor to the Funds of the Church and especially to those of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Her quiet but deeply spiritual life was an example to us all.

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### THE RECTOR'S REPORT

Again we pause at the beginning of another year, to look back over our life as a parish family during the Year of Our Lord 1961. We give thanks for our successes and our advances. We confess, and pray forgiveness for, our failures and our shortcomings. And we ask for Grace, that we may serve GOD more faithfully in every department of our work and worship in this New Year 1962.

Let us begin, as we should, in the realm of worship. And let us remember that our highest duty and supremest privilege as worshippers is to obey our Lord's command: "Do this in remembrance of Me".

We must face the fact that there are far too few Communion made at St. Peter's. There are far too many of our people who seem content to Communicate a dozen times or less in the course of the year. Instead of the fifteen or twenty who make their Communion at eight o'clock there should be fifty or so, out of the more than three hundred confirmed adults and children in our Parish. As for the Daily Services, they are supported by the same little handful of people week in and week out, and all too often they must take the form of Ante-Communion for lack of anyone besides the priest to Communicate. "My brethren, these things ought not so to be!"

The main line of advance during 1961 seems to have been on the material front, although even the ringing of doorbells to obtain pledges of financial support has brought benefits on the spiritual side as well. The details of The Every Person Visitation and Canvass, and its results up to the end of 1961, are given in the Chairman's Report. Here it is only in order to congratulate and thank Mr. A. L. Cameron, his Committee Captains and Teams, for the splendid work that was done, with the expert counsel and advice of Canon Hobbs our Diocesan Commissioner.

Outstanding work has been done as usual by our Women's Organizations. Again we refer you for details to their separate reports. One of the useful and decorative results of their generosity is the curtains that so enhance the appearance of the Parish Hall, and allow it to be darkened in day-time for the projection of films and slides.

The Sunday School has had a good year, with excellent attendance most of the time. A successful Picnic was held in June, and

in connection with the Christmas Party an innovation cheerfully welcomed by our boys and girls was the giving of presents, (instead of receiving them), to the children of needy families in certain rural Island parishes.

The work of Mrs. Douglas Hill with the Little Helpers is much appreciated. It is good to see St. Peter's congregation of the future so well looked after.

Mrs. Patterson and Miss Brenton, as leaders of the Choir, have very properly been laying more emphasis on the importance of choir practice as preparation for leading the praises of the people of GOD. We are grateful to them and to all others who have shown themselves loyal to this commendable principle.

Our able and astute Finance Warden, Mr. Frank Carbonell, left the parish during the year. His successor pro tem, Dr. H. H. Kelly, has carried on efficiently in the interim, together with Mr. Cliff Orford, whose conscientiousness as Property Warden is exemplary. They and their fellow Vestrymen, greatly aided by Vestry Clerk A. E. Breedon and Envelope Secretary M. V. Blake have rendered splendid service to St. Peter's.

A very special word of thanks is due to Mrs. John Sutherland, who, frequently during the year, and regularly since Mr. Carbonell's departure has mimeographed the weekly Service Bulletin.

The week-day activities of our boys and girls have been further provided for in the formation of a Boy Scout Troop under the leadership of a newcomer to the congregation, Mr. Patterson Carr. His efforts on behalf of the boys are greatly appreciated, as are those of Mr. FitzGerald, the Cub-master. The Girl Guides, who meet in St. Peter's hall, and The Brownies, provide interesting activities for several of our girls. The Girls Auxiliary and the Junior Auxiliary, our local branches of Canada-wide Anglican girls' organizations, are a training ground for future active and instructed church-women. The A.Y.P.A., reduced in numbers, but still in being, has been meeting jointly with St. Paul's also-small branch in recent months. Our members have not been inactive on the home front, however, having been responsible for the decorating of the Cathedral for Christmas and the distribution of gifts to shut-ins and inmates of Charlottetown institutions.

The Laymen's Association has met from time to time around the supper table for a brief evening's programme. Plans are being made by its Executive for greater activity along the lines of fellowship and edification in the coming year.

RECTOR'S REPORT CONT'D.

St. Peter's has played its part well in the larger work of the Church outside the parish. The apportionment was again overpaid by ten percent. and the sum of five thousand dollars was remitted towards the payment of our Diocesan Extension and Kings College pledges.

A handsome terrazzo floor was placed in All Souls Chapel during the year, enhancing the beauty of an already beautiful building. It is a memorial to the late Mr. & Mrs. John Orlebar Hyndman and is the gift of their daughter Mrs. A. G. Macmillan. The floor will be dedicated to the Glory of GOD upon the completion of a suitable memorial tablet. A gift of several New Prayer Books from the Hon. F.W.Hyndman and Mrs.A.F.Macmillan is very much appreciated.

Another valued gift to the Cathedral, for which funds were provided by the Women's Guild, was a set of green Eucharistic Vestments for daily use. These came in a partially made-up form and were completed and made ready for use by members of the Altar Guild.

Last winter's storms proved too much for the roof and flashings of All Souls Chapel, and the leaks which developed damaged the recently renovated sacristy walls inside. A new roof, etc. were installed, and Mr. Edgar Acorn kindly volunteered his services for repainting the sacristy after the repairs had been made.

A number of visiting Bishops and Priests have taken part in our services during the year: the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia and the Co-adjutor Bishop; the Rt. Rev. Reginald Pierce, Bishop of Athabaska; the Rt. Rev. Tom Greenwood, Bishop of Yukon; the Very Rev. C. A. Simpson, Dean of Christ Church, Oxford; the Rev. Canon E. H. Hobbs, Diocesan Commissioner; the Rev. Eric Ingraham, Edward Tuck, W. A. Powel; also the clergy of our own Deanery who took part in the D.C.S. - W.A. Service in April.

The Rector is grateful indeed for Canon Malone's cheerful willingness to take occasional duty, especially on those Sundays when services are to be conducted at Georgetown or Souris, and he would like to thank Lay Readers H. B. Armstrong and Paul Kays for their help at various times. Mr. Barrett, the Sexton has performed a number of personal services for the Rectory family and these are gratefully acknowledged.

The generous offering at Christmas was tangible evidence of the friendly loyalty of a congregation with whom it has been a privilege to co-operate in worship and in work during 1961.

Let us go forward together into 1962, more conscious than ever

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BROWNIE REPORT

It has been a very successful year for the 1st & 3rd Brownie Pack. We began the session with 34 members. In November eight of these progressed to Guides, 7 having passed all Tests necessary to make them First Class Brownies. We welcomed 10 new members who were duly enrolled by Commissioner Mrs. E. M. Found. A total of ten extra proficiency badges was earned by the Brownies.

During my absence for six weeks in early Spring the Pack was capably carried on by the then Tawny Owl, Mrs. James Enman, who organised the making of Easter gifts for the child patients at the Sanatorium. In May the Brownies made a total of 116 gifts for the old folks at Beach Grove. The entire Pack visited there and a programme of songs, dances and recitations was greatly enjoyed by the patients.

Once again we have to express thanks to the members of the Local Association who catered for our Annual Tulip Tea. This was well attended and closed our Pack for summer holidays.

Our Funds were augmented by a donation from the ladies of St. Peter's Guild and from the Sale of Fudge at the Kirk Hallowe'en Tea. We are most grateful to the ladies of both congregations for their help.

BROWNIE REPORT CONT'D.

I also wish to express thanks to the friends who assisted with our Christmas Party. This was held on December 13th and was attended by 60 Brownies and Friends.

It was with regret that I learned of Mrs. Enman's decision to resign from her work with the Brownies. She had been Tawny Owl for two years and her services were much appreciated by all those associated with the Pack.

We are fortunate that Mrs. Edward Selwyn offered her services in this capacity. A third leader, however, is necessary and I wish to take this opportunity to bring our need in this respect to the attention of the congregation.
