extra appeals, also generously supported, we have met in full our Apportionment and Assessment for the work of the Church in the Diocese and beyond. No parish that shows such a record year after year should harbour any thoughts of defeat or failure, as it assesses the service it has rendered to the larger work of the Church in the world.

About the situation nearer home, however, we have had some misgivings. For many months we have realized that we are handicapped in our physical facilities. At the same time we realize what we should have in the way of buildings and equipment, in order to provide for the needs of our children and young people, not to mention the requirements of adult organizations. It is a gap between what we have and what we need that has been the cause of our uncertainty and sense of frustration. We are a very small body of people. The operation of the law of averages, which works here as it does elsewhere, means that we can count on only a part of our small membership to support any serious drive for funds for a building programme. To succeed in such an effort would call for much more than token-giving from as large a number of parishioners as possible. The question which has haunted meetings of vestry and congregation alike has been, to use a familiar and homely turn of phrase, would we be biting off more than we could chew if we were to mount a full scale building plan? This question, disturbing and unsettling, still remains to be answered.

Even with our present facilities, however, we have had a good year in the Sunday School, which shows steady growth as year succeeds to year. We are not far short of the hundred mark, ninety-five to be exact, and it is obvious that we shall need more space in the near future, with an average attendance last year of eighty per cent. During 1966 your Rector appointed as Lay Superintendent of the School, Mr. Thomas Smith. This has made it possible for someone to be in charge every Sunday morning and to be present at both the beginning and the end of every session. We should all be grateful to Mr. Smith, and to our loyal and devoted teachers, for their shepherding of the parish children during the past year.

I should like also to say a very special word of thanks to Miss Brenton and Mrs. Patterson, and those members of the choir who have been faithful and regular in coming to services and rehearsals. Nineteen sixty-six was a hard year for the choir,

whose ranks were depleted by the loss of several of its best choristers, as they moved away from Charlottetown to other provinces. It is not to be wondered at that, with no one coming forward to take their places, something of a crisis developed during the year.

Dr. Kelly and Mr. Orford and the members of the Vestry deserve our gratitude for their faithfulness to duty throughout the months of 1966. Theirs has not been an easy task. Their report reflects the difficulty of the problems they have had to cope with.

An outstanding event of the year was the great gathering of parishioners on the twenty-sixth of February to honour Canon Malone on the sixtieth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. Earlier in the same day a commemorative Eucharist took place in the Cathedral, and this too was well attended. A further honour came to this beloved priest during 1966, when the degree of Doctor of Laws, honoriscausa, was conferred upon him by St. Dunstan's University.

His lordship the Bishop of the Diocese visited us for a Confirmation in April. This was followed by a reception, an opportunity for Bishop Davis to meet and talk with the candidates and the congregation. Priests of this and other dioceses, who conducted or assisted in services during the year, were Canon J. W. Cornish of Ottawa, the Rev. G.R.F. Ebsary of Nova Scotia, the Rev. William Warren of Alaska, and the Rev. William Powel of Pennsylvania. Thanks is due to all these priests, and to our Lay Readers, Messrs. Paul Kays and H. B. Armstrong, for their welcome assistance.

Although his itinerary, regrettably, did not include a visit to this province, the most important event of 1966 for the Diocese and the whole Canadian Church, was the visit of His Grace the Right Honorable and Most Reverend Michael Ramsey, Primate of all England and Archbishop of Canterbury, the acknowledged centre of our world-wide Anglican Communion. Among the events and occasions accompanying the Archbishop's all to brief visit to the Diocese of Nova Scotia was a great service of witness and thanks-giving in the Cathedral of All Saints, Halifax, at which your Rector, in his capacity as Archdeacon of Prince Edward Island, had the honour of reading one of the two Lessons for Evensong.

The Guild-sponsored annual Bazaar and Supper excelled its previous record of success. The ladies of the Guild, and those of Anglican Church Women (to give the W.A. its new name) have worked as hard as ever for objects in the parish and beyond. The hidden labours of the Altar Guild have kept the ornaments of the sanctuary spotless and shining, and in good repair. The leaders of our youth groups have been active and enthusiastic. The Laymen's Association, while not regularly active during the year, provided transportation for the Sunday School Picnic, and arranged with the help of the ladies a supper-meeting at which the guest-speaker was Monsignor Simpson, the Rector of St. Dunstan's Basilica. At an election of officers following the supper plans were made for a much more active life of the association in 1967.

Many generous Christmas gifts and holiday greeting cards came to us at the Rectory at the end of the year. I take this opportunity of thanking all those who showed their friendship in these ways.

Let us go forward together into the year of our Lord 1967, the Centennial of our nation's founding, determined, with the help of God, to follow with greater loyalty and devotion His Son Jesus Christ, in the Faith and Fellowship of His Church. "Let us", in the words of Hebrews 10:24, "consider one another to provoke unto love and good works; not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is. " For today, as in the past, the foundation of an effective Christian witness is faithful and regular Christian worship.

WARDENS REPORT

This report is brief. Our progress or lack of progress on the New Hall was reported at the Special Congregational meeting in November. We have kept our repairs, etc. down to an absolute minimum as agreed at the last Annual Meeting. There were, however, various matters that needed attention. The Kitchen and Apartment were fumigated. The Guild Room walls were painted. The Kitchen ceiling was painted. The walls of the Kitchen and the stove were cleaned and repaired prior to the annual supper. There were minor repairs to seats in the Church and a new front step was installed. The rectory steps and garage were repaired.

During our term of duty a new Sexton was employed.

We have not been able financially to do any further improvements. The bell over the Sexton's quarters should be placed in the Church Belfry. This would cost about \$1000.00. The Church is in good repair, except that improvements in the lighting would be an advantage and the brickwork on the sides of the Church should be repointed in the near future. If we are to keep the Sunday School for another year plaster should be mended in both Kitchen and Guild room.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING - JANUARY 24TH, 1966 at 7.30 p.m.

The Annual Meeting was held in the Church Hall at 7.30 p.m. 36 members present.

Archdeacon J. R. Davies Presiding.

Archdeacon J. R. Davies opened the meeting with prayer.

The Minutes of the last annual meeting printed in the annual report were adopted as printed on motion of A. H. Peake, seconded by Dr. H. H. Kelly. Carried.

Mrs. Salem Korrey asked what had been done in regard to the Diocesan Times payments. It was explained that due to a change of vestry clerks in March, this was not done.

It was decided that the following Resolution be made and carried out for 1966.

MOVED by Art Peake, seconded by A. E. Breedon, that the Vestry pay the dues for all members of the congregation for the Diocesan Times, and the Vestry in turn bill each member for the dues paid on his or her behalf. A raise of hands showed 15 in favor and 11 against the motion.... carried.

Archdeacon J. R. Davies read a letter from the Canadian Bible Society Tasking for two representatives from St. Peter's Cathedral. Mr. Arthur Peake nominated himself. Dr. H. L. Palmer nominated Miss Bernice Rowland as the second delegate. Moved by Dr. Kelly seconded by Tom Rogers that nominations cease. Carried.

Protestant Family Service Bureau: Mr. Art Peake said he was working on this at the present time and should have a representative shortly.

Mrs. A. G. MacMillan explained the services done by the Protestant Family Service Bueeau. She also said she was pleased to see that the Vestry has increased the giving to the bureau by 20%. She also said the Bureau at present has 15 infants out for adoption. The Bureau meets once a month on Tuesday 7 to 8 p.m. She said the bureau is looking for a representative from St. Peter's who has a good knowledge about financial matters.

Correspondence:

Archdeacon J. R. Davies spoke on the Diocese of Nova Scotia. He

said operation expenses in the Diccese have increased over the past year. He said our apportionment was approximately \$5069.00 and our assessment was approximately \$1200.00, although this was for for a worthy cause Archdeacon Davies suggested that we stick to our 100% object for 1966 rather than 110%. This was for 1966 only.

New Business:

Major MacNutt on our Debt of \$18,300 (He thought it would be impossible to build a new Sunday School in less than 15 years at the rate we were going to reduce our present debt of \$10000, bank loan and \$8300. pledge.

Mr. MacNutt also spoke on the Annual Report. He said it was prepared in an excellent way. Mr. MacNutt also asked what the various Trust Accounts were for.

Mr. A. H. Peake spoke on this subject and made the following explanations:

Various Cathedral Endowments Sundry Securities:

This was used as an investment and the Brecken Trust

Mr. A. H. Peake explained the Bank Loan and the Diocesan Pledge. He also spoke on the givings of the Parishioners. He said givings per week amounted from .25 to \$10.00. He felt some were away out of line in comparison with salaries, etc.

Mr. Peake also pointed out that the Agency Account does not correspond with the bequest. This is to be checked.

Moved by Dr. Kelly, seconded by Miss Rowland that the Annual Report be adopted as printed. Carried.

It was asked if the Church has set out a budget.

Dr. Kelly explained that it was hard to set a budget and stick to it. He did say, however, that spending was kept at a bare minimum.

 Λ . H. Peake read the second last paragraph of the Wardens' Report contained in the printed Annual report honoring Canon Malone on his Diamond Jubilee.

Archdeacon J. R. Davies spoke on his report. He emphasized the need of additional choir members particularly in the men's division. He also spoke highly of the manner in which St. Peter's met the various givings, such as Primate's World Relief, etc.

Mrs. Pickard asked why the Communion hymn was sung in a low voice. It was hard to hear the hymn of the back of the Church. She also asked why the men of the congregation did not volunteer their services to deliver dinners during the annual bazaar.

Archdeacon Davies explained that the communion hymn was sung low to create an atmosphere of Devotion, and that the hymn should be sung low so as not to disturb the communicants during the receiving of the Holy Communion.

Some of the men voiced surprise as to the fact that dinners were being sent out. No men were ever contacted to make delivery arrangements.

Mrs. Rogers spoke on the habit of the children coming in from the Sunday School during the Church Service and being allowed to run back and forth from their seats to the door leading to the Sunday School. It was felt that some of the teachers should accompany them and see that they remain as reasonably quiet as possible.

Archdeacon Davies said the Church Congregation was well pleased with the work being done by the various organizations.

Mrs. Cosh spoke on the Altar Guild. She suggested a letter of thanks from the congregation be sent to Mrs. Alfred Blackmore, 1002 Ontario Street, R.R.#1, Coburg, Ont. for the generous gift given by her to the Altar Guild in memory of her Mother. Seconded by Dr. Palmer. Carried.

Miss Pat Rogers spoke on the 1st & 3rd Guide Company. She asked for a nurse to accompany them on their next camp in August, 1966.

Moved by Dr. Kelly, seconded by Tom Rogers, that the various organizations' reports printed in the Annual Report be adopted as printed. Carried.

Mr. Carruthers spoke highly on the manner in which the Annual Report was prepared by Mrs. Robert Acorn.

In the absence of the three members of the nominating committee, Dr. Palmer moved that the following be elected to the Vestry:

Eugene Korrey (One Year) Frank Weatherbie, Art Holland, Don Carruthers, Frank Michael, Clifford Orford, William Shama (All Two Years)

Seconded by Robert. Acorn.

Robert Acorn Moved Nominations cease, seconded by Tom Rogers. Carried.

Moved by Art Peake, seconded by Dr. Palmer that the D.C.S. Delegates and Synod Representative and Sub be elected by the Vestry. Carried.

Moved by Paul Kays, seconded by Art Holland That the new Vestry hold a special congregational meeting to start the proceedings on the construction of a new Sunday School, hall & apartment for sexton. Carried.

Dr. Palmer moved a vote of thanks to the Rector, Wardens & Vestry, Choir and various organizations for the work done by them in the year 1965, seconded by Art Holland. Carried.

Dr. Palmer moved adjournment of meeting at 10.30. Carried.

of Anglican Church Women. In 1897 the first Women's group was formed here in St. Peter's Cathedral and to many of our older and such loyal Members it will no doubt still be referred to in their minds and thoughts as "The Auxiliary". However, we must move with the constantly changing times and it was considered that the new title provided flexibility and freedom in Parishes and Diocese.

In February we experienced very cold weather and attendance was low, but generally we averaged 20 during the year.

Miss Arsenault delivered materials for sewing and the President distributed same to willing members. In November Mrs. J. D. Webster passed away after a very long illness. We missed Mrs. A. G. Peake from many meetings this year due to illness and hopes are sincere for an improvement in her health.

The usual work for Schools, Red Cross and others have been carried out and the high standard maintained. Loyalty and generosity continue within the group under the very able guidance of President, Mrs. G. Rogers, who never fails to express such appreciation of the work produced by the members. Mrs. Cosh is always alert for help towards our refugee in Germany, and does not permit this helpful service to lapse.

In closing I would like to note that without the help of every member, however small it may seem, the group could not continue and it is only because you have such utter Faith, such complete loyalty that we achieve such wonderful unity and so much completed work.
